

The pier extended some 1014 feet into the sea and was originally built at the cost of £30,000 as a landing stage for cross-channel boats but soon became a fashionable place for promenading. Designed by Sir Samuel Brown (1776-1852), who also built the Norfolk Suspension Bridge, Shoreham and Marlow Bridge, both still in daily use. The pier, which blew down during a gale in 1896, used his chain-linked cables, originally devised for ships and suspension bridges. It was replaced by the Palace Pier in 1898.

It was inaugurated in 1846, to mark Queen Victoria's 27th birthday and, after restoration, re-inaugurated in 1995 by Prince Charles.

A COLLECTION OF AGRICULTURAL AND EXHIBITION MEDALS

The collection of medals contained in the following lots are primarily a record of the achievements of three of the great Victorian manufactures whose inventions opened up a new era in agriculture both here in Britain and throughout the Empire, Europe, Russia, and North and South America. Given the size of some of their machinery, taking pieces to local shows would have been a major task, but for International Expositions the logistics must have been immense.

Clayton & Shuttleworth was established in 1842 in Lincoln, when Nathaniel Clayton (1811-1890) formed a partnership with his brother-in-law, Joseph Shuttleworth (1819-1883). In 1851, the year of the Great Exhibition, they sold some 200 steam engines, by 1890 this had grown to 26,000 steam engines and 24,000 threshing machines. They established branches in Vienna, Pest, Prague, Cracow and Lemburg. In 1901 Alfred Shuttleworth (1843-1925), son of the founder, became chairman. During the Great War they turned to aircraft manufacture, especially the Sopwith Camel. But it proved impossible to maintain huge levels of production and the Company was taken over during the depression of the 1930s by Marshall, Sons & Co.

Marshall, Sons & Co had been founded in 1848 in Gainsborough, Lincolnshire by William Marshall and made agricultural machinery, portable steam engines and threshing machines which were exported worldwide. When William Marshall died in 1861 the ownership passed to his sons, James and Henry, and agricultural machinery was exported from Marshall's all over the world. During the Great War the works employed 5000 men in the manufacture of munitions. Following the take-over of Clayton & Shuttleworth, the company was renamed Marshall, Sons & Company (Successors) Ltd in 1936. During the Second World War they made midget submarines and continued their focus on the production of diesel tractors, road rollers etc. The company traded until 1947.

E. H. Bentall & Co took its name from Edward Hammond Bentall (1814-1898), the son of the firm's founder, William. Their Broadshare plough (cultivator dynamometer) won a medal in Class IX of the Great Exhibition, though sadly this is missing from the collection. The firm continued in business at Heybridge till 1961 when it was taken over by the Acrow Group, who were to go into liquidation in 1984.

J. W. Woolley & Co of Tamworth, had a Royal Warrant for their dairy equipment.


Charcot's Antarctic expedition in the Pourquoi-Pas? lasted from 1909-1911. He went on to command a Q-boat in the Royal Navy during the Great War, winning a Distinguished Service Cross. On the night of 15 September 1936 the Pourquoi-Pas? sank during a storm off Iceland taking Charcot with her.
