





He transferred to the RAF on its creation on 1 April 1918 as a temporary Brigadier-General. He retired from the RAF in 1920.

The medal commemorates the discovery of their remains.

The same design was used for medals awarded by other training ships – HMS *Arethusa*, HMS *Exmouth* and HMS *Goliath*. HMS *Chichester* was a 52-gun fourth rate launched in 1843, but laid up that year. She was lent as a training ship in 1866, the first Shaftesbury Homes' training ship, and replaced by HMS *Arethusa* (see following lot) and was sold in 1889. At that time the Shaftesbury Homes were known as 'The National Refuges for Destitute Children' - a society having it's origin in 1843.

The same design was used for medals awarded by other training ships – HMS *Chichester*, HMS *Exmouth* and HMS *Goliath*. HMS *Arethusa*, HMS *Arethusa* was a Constance class frigate of 50 guns, launched in 1849 and lengthened as a screw frigate in 1860. She was hulked in 1874 when she replaced the frigate HMS *Chichester* as the Shaftesbury Homes' training ship. She continued in this role until 1932 when the four-masted Barque Peking took her place. She was then broken up in 1934.

Science, Norway, Christopher Hansteen (1784-1873), Copper Medal, 1861, by R Bergslein, bustright, *rev* legend within and around wreath, 38mm (Wurzb 3566). *Very fine though the reverse stained*. £30-50

Hansteen, Norwegian geophysicist, astronomer and physicist, first to map the Earth's magnetic field.



747 Sport, Angling, Red Spinner Angling Society, Silver Medal, 1937, for an 11lb 8oz Trout at Loch Rannoch, fish and reel design, 36.5mm, 28.35g, suspension loop and ring. *One time polished, very fine*. £30-50

The trout hardly seems worthy of a medal when compared with the British Record of over 31lbs 12ozs (39 inches long, girth 25.5 inches and the tail measured 11 inches), caught 15 March 2002, in Loch Awe. The Red Spinner Angling Society is still active.



748 Sport, Cycling, Germany, Seeg, Tin-backed Shaped Silver Brooch, 1899, by Abzeichenfabrik, Munich, cherubic figure with fixed-wheel bicycle, ALL HEIL 1899, 35mm, green cloth surround. Very fine. £50-80



Record, Buenos Aires, 2 April 1931, Victory flies over two racing boats, engraved to "Stanley Orme – Miss England II", 31mm, suspension loop; smaller Silver Medal, 2nd International 'Riunione Motonautica', Gardone, 8-18 March 1931 (Yr 9), centaur above speeding boats, *rev* crowned star on anchor, suspension loop; silver cufflinks, armoured knight's head. *Generally very fine*. (4) £100-150

Miss England II was Sir Henry Segrave's boat in which he captured the water speed record on Lake Windemere on 13 June 1930 moments befor he hit a log and capsized killing both himself and his mechanic. The boat was recovered and, under the ownership of Lord Wakefield and driven by Kaye Don, subsequently broke two more world water speed records.



750 Viniculture, France, Angelo Mariani (1838-1914), inventor of Vin Mariani – a cocawine, uniface Silver Medal, undated, by Louis-Oscar Roty, bust of the bearded Mariani left, a bottle behind him, VULGARISATEVR DE LA COCA, 30mm. Extremely fine, rare.

Mariani invented the first cocawine in 1863 when he introduced an extract from the coca leaves to a red wine. It met with huge success an boasted the Pope and Queen Victoria as patrons. In America John Pemberton of Atlanta produced his own variety of Vin Mariani, but when the city introduced prohibition in 1886, he removed the alcohol and established Coca-Cola. The medal is known without the outer border and Roty, perhaps a patron, also produced a plaquette for Vin Mariani.
