

John Gallon 1944 - 2003

Born in Middlesbrough, he started collecting from a very early age when an uncle took him foraging in junk shops. His find of a Roman coin in one started a life long interest. His love of coins grew and continued throughout his student days in Oxford. He gained an MA in Biochemistry and then a D.Phil (Tyrosine Decarboxylase and Related Reactions in Higher Plants) before leaving Oxford for a fellowship in the Prairie Regional Laboratory in Saskatoon, Canada, where he spent two years. Whilst there, he naturally collected Canadian and American coins and also began his collection of mediæval hammered coins.

On return to the UK and after a further year in Oxford, he was appointed to a lectureship in Biochemistry at Swansea University, where he progressed through the ranks and finally became a professor in 1993, after being awarded a D.Sc from Oxford in 1991.

Although he was based in Swansea, his growing international reputation for his research meant that he travelled widely and, amongst other places, he spent periods of time in Moscow, Bratislava, Nebraska, Amsterdam, Mexico, Uzbekistan and Canberra and was involved in research cruises to the Caribbean and the Baltic.

Everywhere he went was a further opportunity to collect coins. His time in Moscow, collaborating on a research project with a Russian scientist, who was also a keen coin collector, started a love of Russian coins, which was timely as he felt that his British collection had almost been completed to the limit of his pocket! His interest in Russian coins led to a series of coin articles published by 'Coin News'. He had plans to write more in his retirement.

He looked upon the collecting of coins as a great way to learn the history of a country, as well as to learn the rudiments of different alphabets. He was an inveterate and eclectic collector who found almost anything interesting and he had collections of stamps, records and CDs, books, phone cards and even Teletubbies as well as his coins. Coins were the love of his life though and he liked nothing better than the thrill of tracking down a particular coin to fill a gap in the collection.

He was a happy man, who enjoyed his role in life, both in the university and at home. He was married in 1969 and had two daughters, Charlotte and Victoria, of whom he was very proud. The birth of his grandson, Joshua in December 2002 put a permanent smile on his face. Sadly he was diagnosed with cancer in May 2003 and he died in August. The way he dealt with his final illness with quiet dignity and not a little wry humour impressed all who knew him. He is greatly missed, not only by his family, but also by his many friends and colleagues worldwide.

The propaganda in this coin is clear. Minted when M Junius Brutus and C Cassius Longinus retreated to Greece, having failed to win support after the assassination of Julius Caesar, the obverse design is based on the Denarius previously issued by Brutus, depicting his ancestor L Junius Brutus, who successfully overthrew the Tarquins to become the traditional founder of the Roman Republic. bought Elsen 66, 633

Scythian Kings, Kanites (c.180-150 BC), Ae 24mm, 8.2g, jugate heads right, of Demeter and Persephone, *rev* ΒΑΣΙΛΕΩΣ ΚΑΝΙΙΤΟΥ two corn stalks, BAK below (Pick, AMNG pl.XIII 6; SNG Stancomb -; SNG BM -). *Deep green patina, about very fine*. £40-60
