Fothergill was a founder member of the Medical School of London. In 1758 he purchased the school at Ackworth from the London Foundling Hospital and opened it as a "Friends' School" in 1779. The school has retained its Georgian features and still florishes today.

Galen (129-c.216), born in Pergamum, studied medicine in Alexandria, travelled widely in Egypt and learnt much of the pharmacology of India and Africa. He continues to be revered as a "father of medicine".

1781 George II, The Royal Family, large Silver Complimentary Medal, 1732, by J Croker and J S Tanner [reverse], busts of George and Caroline vis-à-vis, date in exergue, *rev* bust of Frederick, Prince of Wales with his six siblings around, 69.5mm (MI 500/47). *Extremely fine*. £1800-2200

The medal struck by order of the King for presentation to foreign dignitaries

1782 George II, The Marriage of Prince Frederick of Denmark (later Frederick V), to Princess Louisa, youngest daughter of George II, Silver Medal, 1743, by G W Wahl, Hymen and Plenty support three shields within wreath, *rev* legend within central wreath, with details of the marriages of their predecessors in eight wreaths around, 65mm, only 181 specimens struck (MI 581/219; Galster 389). *About very fine and extremely rare, has been cleaned*. £150-200

Princess Louise was first married in Hanover with the Duke of Cumberland as proxy for Prince Frederick. The couple were re-married in Copenhagen, when these rare medals were placed on the plates of the guests at the reception. Galster records that 14 examples were struck in gold and 181 in silver.

1783 George II, Naval Action off Toulon, a White Metal Medal, 1744, by A R Werner, laureate bust of the King left, *rev* Neptune rides a shell chariot drawn by two sea-horses, behind two ships sink, ADVOBVS, 44.5mm (MI 583/223, illustrated [in silver only]; MH 341; Sand EE.26; Brockmann 890). *Struck, as is usual, with copper plug, extremely fine and extremely rare.* £150-180

This rare medal commemorates the defeat of the combined French and Spanish Fleets by Mathews and Lestock, who were both impeached for their failure to pursue the fleeing ships. Lestock was acquited but Mathews was dismissed from the Navy. The medallist seems to have been confused when signing the medal as his initials are preceded by "fec" in reverse.

William Pulteney, Earl of Bath 1744, Copper Medal, by A Dassier, bust right, rev legend in wreath, 54mm (MI 586/229). Extremely fine or better. £50-70

William Pulteney, Earl of Bath (1682-1764), politician and statesman

1785 Gibraltar, Edward, Duke of Kent, Appointed Governor, Copper Medal, 1802, unsigned, bust of the Duke left, wearing uniform, *rev* panorama of the North face of Gibraltar, 38mm (BHM 531; MH 133; Sand PP.4). *Extremely fine*.

Edward Augustus, Duke of Kent and Strathern, fourth son of George III. His Governorship was short-lived, for having been sent to restore discipline the severity of his methods were to prove too much

1786 George III, The Peace of Amiens, Copper Medal, 1802, by C H Küchler, bust of the king left, wearing armour, *rev* Peace with a torch sets fire to military trophies, 48mm (BHM 535; Pollard 25, var; d'E 977); The Peace Celebrated at St Paul's Cathedral, Copper Medal, 1802, by J G Hancock, George III as classical warrior, crowned by Victory, REGNO PACEM OBTULIT, *rev* façade of the Cathedral, 49mm (BHM 541; Br 209; d'E 970). *Good very fine*. (2)

The celebration service, as stated on the medal, was held on the 1st June, 1802

- 1787 Wellington, Tribute Medal, copper gilt [1812], with title of Earl, by T Webb, bust left, after Catherine Andra, signed on truncation, *rev* VOTA PVBLICA within wreath, 54mm (BHM 746, not listed as gilt; Eimer, *Wellington* 10). *Extremely fine*. £70-90
- 1788 Wellington, unfinished Copper Medal or Token, c.1815, laureate bust right, no facial features, within wreath, *rev* two olive branches on 'pyramid', edge, FIELD MARSHAL THE DUKE OF WELLINGTON, K.G.& G.C.B., 36mm (BHM 898, R2; Eimer, *Wellington* Ap 1). *Very fine and very rare*

Eimer places this in his section of "Portraits mistakenly identified as being of Wellington or otherwise doubtful". However examination of the medal and its 36mm diameter, seem to indicate that it is the edge rather than the obverse and reverse that are of importance, and it seems quite possible that this was a Royal Mint trial for the naming on the Duke's Waterloo medal.

1789 George IV, White Metal Medal, 41mm, by T W Ingram, bear head left, rev BORN AUG^T 12 1762 ASCENDED JAN^Y 29 1820 CROWN'D JULY 19 1821, in exergue, THE ENLIGHTENMENT AND FATHER OF HIS PEOPLE, two allegorical figures mourning either side of funerary urn (BHM 1376). About very fine, rare in white metal. £40-60

- 1790 City of London School Foundation 1834, Æ, by B Wyon, view of school, rev knowledge seated instructs a youth, 57mm (BHM 1680; E 1279; W 4; Taylor 120a), extremely fine, parts of obverse legend weakly struck; Winchester Cathedral 1856, Æ, by J Wiener, general exterior view of cathedral, rev interior view, 59mm (van H 141; Reinecke 36), good very fine, some light abrasions in field. (2) £40-60
- 1791 Queen Victoria as Empress of India 1877, Bronze Medal, half-length bust of Queen Victoria almost facing, wearing an ornate Empress's crown and a richly decorated empress robe, medal is shaped as a trefoil, 215mm x 168mm approx, original suspension loop. Very fine and rare, and a most unusual portrait of Queen Victoria. £200-400
- 1792 The Royal Club, a thin silver shield, stamped crowned arms with dalmation supporters, ROYAL CLUB 1887, with maker's marks (?) left and right, 90mm x 82mm. Of uncertain age, very fine. £40-60
 - The motto VIRTUS NON STEMMA (Worth not Birth) is not uncommon and is used, amongst others, by the Dukes of Westminster and the Irvine Clan
- 1793 Chess, Hastings Junior League, Square Silver Medal in form of partial chess board, MATE IN 3, awarded 1903-1904, 28mm. *Extremely fine*. £60-80
- Motor Racing, The Edinburgh and District Motor Club, Gold Medal, awarded 1919, Victory balanced on a winged wheel, *rev* engraved inscription, "J. A. Newman, 3 ½ Sunbeam 1919 Scottish 6 Days", 26mm, 9ct, integral suspension loop, and ring. *Extremely fine*. £120-140
 - The six day trials were rough events with gruelling driving conditions and they are now limited to motor cycles
- 1795 Scotland, Dornoch Academy, Silver Medal for French, awarded 1926, Birmingham hallmark, 44mm. *Extremely fine*. £40-60
- 1796 George VI, Coronation Regatta, Torbay, Silver Medal, 1937, by H B Sale, conjoined crowned busts left, *rev* the [Royal] Yacht *Britannia*, 51mm, hallmarked on edge (BHM 4385). *Struck with a matt surface, very fine.* £60-80
 - The Britannia was built for Edward VII when still Prince of Wales, but was scuttled on the instructions of George V, following his death
- 1797 Yorkshire Agricultural Society (instituted 1837), Silver Medal, awarded 1939 (J D Colville. Pigeon Section. Halifax Show. 1939), standing figure of Flora, *rev* armorial shield within wreath, 55mm, Birmingham hallmark, maker Mappin & Webb, struck with a matt surface. *Extremely fine.* £30-40

Polar Exploration

1798 Polar Exploration, HMS Discovery, The National Antarctic Expedition, Antarctic Sports, Silver Medal, a penguin on an ice floe, iceberg beyond, *rev* legend, ANTARCTIC SPORTS WON BY, 28.5mm, with loop and ring for suspension (Poulsom -). *Obviously a much-prized medal, worn as a fob, fine and extremely rare.* £300-400

Details of the small medals are recorded by David E Yelverton, *Antartica Unveiled*, Boulder, 2000. Type 1, which has a similar obverse but a blank reverse, was awarded at the discretion of officers, whilst type 2 was for Sport. The sporting activities ranged from an athletics meeting held on the 9th November 1902, in honour of the King's birthday, to dominoes and acrosticks. It is just possible that this medal was once named, but if so nothing now remains. HMS Discovery, a wooden barque of 1,570 tons, built Dundee, 1901, was the ship of the Royal Geographical Society's "National Antarctic Expedition" commanded by Captain Robert Falcon Scott – Scott's First Expedition. She sailed from Cowes on the 6th August, 1901, arriving in Antarctica in January 1902. She was ice-bound during the following winter but freed again by the SV's *Morning* [see next lot], and *Terra Nova*, finally arriving back at Portsmouth on the 10th September, 1904. A similar medal, awarded to Lieut. C W R Royds, was sold by Christies, 26 September, 1997 [Lot 130].

1799 Polar Exploration, The British Antarctic Expedition, 1903-1904, an engraved Half-Sovereign, mounted as a fob, *obv* engraved with penguin on an ice floe with rising sun beyond, NATIONAL ANTARCTIC EXPEDITION, S.V. MORNING, *rev* engraved date, 1904 below St George, 19mm. *Very fine and a unique memento of the expedition.* £200-250

The SV *Morning* was the supply ship twice sent from New Zealand to the aid of Captain Scott on his first expedition of 1902-1904. Captained by William Colbeck (1870-1930), the ship arrived on the 25th January, 1903, but was unable to reach the *Discovery* and supplies were sledged in. There was some exchange of personnel, including Shackleton, and the ship sailed back to New Zealand on March 1st. The 1903 date on the coin suggests that it relates to this first voyage. The second was in the company of the *Terra Nova* and the two ships arrived almost a year later on the 5th January, 1904, and by the 16th February had helped the Discovery break out of the ice.

1800 Polar Exploration, Sir Vivian Ernest Fuchs (1908-1999), The Commonwealth Trans-Antarctic Expedition, 1957-1958, The Royal Geographical Society's Medal, Bronze, by Frank Kovacs (and Spink & Son), bust of Fuchs left, *rev* map of Antarctica with the route marked, 64mm (Poulsom pl.V; BHM 4473, R4). *Struck with a matt surface, virtually mint state and very rare.* £150-200

BHM states that only 36 bronze medals were struck, though Poulsom lists 37 recipients! Fuchs was a geologist and explorer and had been on expeditions to Greenland (1929) and Africa (1930-1938). He led the Commonwealth Trans-Antarctic Expedition with Sir Edmund Hillary leading a New Zealand party, and reached the Pole on the 19th January, 1958. He went on to direct the British Antarctic Survey, retiring in 1973.

FOREIGN COMMEMORATIVE MEDALS

Austria

- 1801 St Stephen's Church, Vienna 1862, Copper Medals (2), by J Wiener, general exterior view, *rev* interior view, 59mm (van H 190; Reinecke 54). *Both almost as struck*. (2) £30-50
- 1802 Linz, Industrial Exhibition, Silver Award Medal, undated, by JS and J CH, city arms, crowned, within wreath, *rev* figure of industry with various representative pieces including locomotive, 44mm, in silk-lined case of issue. *Extremely fine, toned*. £60-80
- 1803 World War I, Field-Marshal E F von Böhm-Ermoli (1856-1941), the re-capture of Lemburg, Silver Medal, 1916, bust, almost full-face, wearing tall cap, *rev* a crusading knight, 33mm. *Extremely fine*. £70-90

Böhm-Ermoli commenced the war as commander of the 2nd Army in Serbia and ended it in Odessa, as a Field-Marshal

Belgium

1804 Death of Bishop van Bommel, 1852, Æ Medal, bust to left of the bishop, *rev* interior view of St Paul's church in Liège, 74mm (van H 98). *Extremely fine, slight reverse rim knocks.* £20-30

Chile

1805 Carlos Ibanez del Campo 1958, President, Silver Medal, by R Thenot, bespectacled bust left, *rev* presidential building, 70mm, cased. *About extremely fine*. £40-60

Carlos del Campo held presidential office in Chile for a second time between 1952-1958

Denmark

The Seasons, a circular convex cast Bronze Plaquette, signed Baltzer, and modelled after the antique, a central globe with Day and Night, the Zodiac around, the months shown with various activities, in twelve numbered segments, border around, 160mm. *Very fine*. £20-30

Perhaps by Karl Emil Lauritz Baltzer, a Danish artist, born in Copenhagen in 1875

France

- 1807 Francis I, Exploration 1515, Copper Medal, laureate bust of king left, *rev* on pedestals below a crown, two orbs, one terrestrial, the other astral, VNVS NON SVFFICIT ORBIS (one world is not enough) around, 53mm. *Good very fine, a 19th century striking.* £30-40
- Francis I, Peace Treaty signed with England 1519, Copper Medal, unsigned, laureate cuirassed bust of Francis I left, *rev* Peace seated on pedestal, setting fire to a pile of arms, 56mm (MI 27/10; M de P I, 104A). *Good very fine, a restrike from rusty obverse die and with die crack through cheek.* £35-45
- **1809** Katharine de Medici, Copper Medal, veiled bust of widowed Katharine left, *rev* a broken lance, 51mm (Jones I/216). *Good very fine, a* 19th century striking. £25-35
 - The broken lance refers to the death of her husband Henri II in a jousting tournament
- 1810 Henry IV (1553-1610), and Marie de Medici (1573-1642), and the Dauphin, cast bronze Tribute Medal, by Guillaume Dupré, dated 1603 on truncation and signed below, conjoined busts of the couple to right, he in decorative armour and wearing an order, *rev* the King as Mars clasps the hand of the Queen, as Minerva, between them the naked Dauphin places his father's plumed helmet on his head, continuous beaded border each side, 67mm (Jones 15, 16; Kress 556). *Mount marks at top and bottom, date in exergue erased, an attractive cast with a light patina.* £600-800

- 1811 Louis XIII and Marie de Medici 1614, Copper Medal, by Pierre Regnier, laureate bust of Louis right, *rev* bust of Marie de Medici wearing open standing lace-edged collar, 45mm (Jones II/92). *Good very fine, probably an* 18th century restrike on a larger flan than the original. £40-50
- A Lady of the Court, large cast Portrait Medal, 1624, by Abraham Dupré (1604-1647), bust right, hair plaited and tied up with ribbon, wearing a loose gown fastened below her breasts, a drop pearl earring and a double strand of pearls, signed below AB. DVPRE.F.1624, 125mm, a heart-shaped attachment for suspension loop pinned to top of reverse (Maz II, 713 the Pinchon specimen; cf Baldwin's Auction 31, October 2002, lot 1031). A sensitive portrait, very fine and extremely rare.

This is the second specimen of this medal handled by the cataloguers in two years. The previous was bought by that vendor from Seaby in 1977 as being the Baron Jêrome Pinchon specimen (sold Paris, 1897, lot 653). The present specimen has no known pedigree. Abraham Dupré, 4th son of Guillaume Dupré, like his father, had trained as a sculptor, but was primarily a cannon founder. He is not known to have made many medals with only five listed in *BMC*. But this piece certainly demonstrates Mark Jones's comment in that catalogue, of him being "a highly competent artist"

- 1813 Louis XIV (1643-1715), The Capture of the Cities Courtrai and Tournai, a large Copper Medal, 1667, unsigned, bust of the King right, hair long, wearing lace cravat over armour and mantle around his shoulders, *rev* the King stands, Fame above, personifications of the Cities kneel and offer keys, a River God stands, another reclines, 88mm (TN III, pl.XI, 6). *A few scuff-marks and scratches but nearly extremely fine.* £120-150
- 1814 Louis Auguste de Bourbon, duc du Maine (1670-1736), Grand Maître de l'Artillerie, and Colonel Général des Suisses et des Grisons (1674-1710), Uniface Lead Medal or perhaps a seal impression, de Bourbon in armour on a prancing horse, both with plumed headdresses, military trophies below, including a cannon, 96mm. About very fine, pierced, very rare.

 £70-90

Louis Auguste de Bourbon was the illegitimate son of Louis XIV and the Marquise de Montespan. His other titles included Duc d'Aumale, Comte d'Eu et Pair de France, and Prince de Dombes. He was legitimised when first granted the title of Duke. Following Louis XIV's death he tried to remove control of the government from Philippe II, Duc d'Orleans, the Regent.

The National Assembly, 1788, Copper Medal, fasces within wreath, LES GENS DU TIERSAT DE FRANCHE..., rev legend within wreath, SEQUANI, CIVI VESUNTINO..., 49mm (Hennin -). Extremely fine, inked collection number "69" at 8 o'clock.

Necker convened a second assembly of Notables in November 1788 to try and resolve the matter of the "Third Estate", but the idea of double representation was rejected. A Royal Decree on the 27th November determined the size of the Estates General. The National Assembly was formed and named the following year.

- The Martyrs of the Revolution 1793, an electrotype copy of the extremely rare medal of Louis-Michel Le Peletier de Saint Fargeau (1760-1793), Joseph Chalier (1747-1793), and Jean Paul Marat (1743-1793), three small oval medallic portraits against a background of sprays of oak leaves, 55.5mm (Hennin 583). *Very fine*.
- The Crossing of the Great St Bernard Pass and The Battle of Marengo 1800, a pair of framed and glazed Bronzed Lead Squeezes, by B Andrieu: Napoleon on horseback amidst the mountains, 75mm (Br 35; Julius 788) and profile bust of Napoleon to right, atop flags and trophies, battle scene on tablet below, 75mm (Br 40; Julius 801), the frames in gilt brass with suspension loop and ring. Extremely fine and decorative. (2)

Napoleon, determined to rid Italy of the Austrians, had marched his army from Dijon across the St Bernard Pass, and on the $14^{\rm th}$ June he engaged them at Marengo in Piedmont. Initially caught by surprise when Baron Melas attacked, he was saved by the counter-attack by General Desaix de Veygoux.

- 1818 The Attempt on the Life of Napoleon 1800, Copper Medal, by L Manfredini, bare head right, star in field behind, *rev* Destiny as old man kept to one side by three angels, 59mm (Br 77; d'E 862). *Very fine*.
- Napoleon and Josephine 1805, a pair of uniface Bronzed Soft Metal Medals, by B Andrieu, he laureate bust left, she diademed bust right, 67mm (Br 475, 476; Julius 1504, 1506). *Very fine.* (2) £40-50

A large letter "B" has been incised into the blank reverse of the first medal.

- Napoleon and Marie-Louise, The Entry into France 1810, a Set of Medals (3), Silver, Copper-Gilt and Copper, by Courtot, the cathedral at Strasbourg, *rev* the two names within wreath, 32mm (Br 949; d'E 1285), *very fine*; Marriage Jetton, Silver, two flaming torches, *rev* VOTA PVBLICA, 28mm (Br 943; d'E 1280), *extremely fine*. (4)
- Napoleon and Marie Louise, The Marriage in Paris 1810, Silver Medals (2, one miniature), by Andrieu and Brenet [reverse], conjoined busts right, he laureate, she diademed, *rev* the couple in classical robes at altar, 32mm and 15mm; Copper Medals (2, one miniature), large size as silver, the miniature, by Andrieu, *rev* cupid with thunderbolt (Br 954, 956, 959; d'E 1287, 1290). *First very fine, second fine, perhaps once mounted, last two extremely fine.* (4)
- Napoleon and Marie Louise, The Marriage in Paris 1810, Tribute medal of the City of Lyon, Silver Medal, by Mercié, conjoined busts left, within acanthus leaf wreath, NAPOLIO. MAGNVS. IMP. ET. MARIA. LVDOVICA. AVSTR., rev figure of Lyon at altar, OB. FELICITATEM HYMENIA. AVG, 48mm (Br 960; d'E 1310). Extremely fine, scuffed, two small edge knocks on reverse at 8 and 12 o'clock. £60-70
- The Birth of the King of Rome 1811, Copper Medals (2), by B Andrieu, conjoined busts of Napoleon and Marie-Louise, *rev* head of the infant king left, 41mm and 32mm; another, *rev* by Jouannin, Empress holds baby, 41mm (Br 1091, 1100, 1099; d'E 1335, 1336, 1343). *Extremely fine*. (3) £50-60 Napoleon François-Joseph Charles (1811-1832), King of Rome, 1811-1814, Prince of Parma, 1814-1818, and Duke of Reichstadt. He died of tuberculosis in Vienna, his body being repatriated for burial in Les Invalides in 1940, by order of Hitler.
- The Birth of the King of Rome 1811, and Prix de Rome, Copper Medal, by T Mercandetti, Mars, having descended from temple, passes the baby to Minerva, seated by the base of Trajan's column, rev legend, LABORI ET INDVSTRIAE ..., 68mm (Br 1105). Extremely fine. £40-50

 A later Monnaie striking, stamped COPIE on edge
- Napoleon, a uniface oval Bronze Portrait Plaquette c.1850's, cast in high relief, stereotype uniformed bust to left, wearing hat, NAPOLEON EMP.R ET ROI, 160 x 135mm. *Good very fine, blackened patination*. £50-60
- Notre-Dame Cathedral, Paris 1855, Æ, by J Wiener, southeastern view of cathedral, rev interior, 59mm (van H 122; Reinecke 40); St Ouen's Church, Rouen 1859, Æ, by J Wiener, exterior view of church, rev interior view of nave (van H 171; Reinecke 44). First extremely fine, second almost as struck. (2)
- Napoleon III, The Presentation of a Cradle to commemorate the Birth of the Prince Imperial, large bronze Tribute Medal of the City of Paris, 1856, by J Cavelier and V Galle, the child sleeps on pillows supported by a Napoleonic Eagle, winged Fames above and Zodiac below, *rev* the highly decorated crib against a background of bees, 77mm (Divo 301). *Nearly extremely fine*. £60-80
 - This remarkable Second Empire cradle was designed by Victor Baltard and was worked on by many artists, the sculptor Pierre-Charles Simart being responsible for the figure of Paris that dominates the structure. It is not known to the cataloguers if the Prince used the cradle, one suspects it might have given him sleepless nights!
- National Academy of Music, Inaugurated 1875, Æ, by J Lagrange, view of building, oak and laurel sprigs on lyre in exergue, *rev* plan of academy, 75mm; Music award medal c.1878, Æ, by A Dubois and J Lagrange, bust of Marianne left, *rev* three cherubs sing and play music, 45mm. *Very fine and extremely fine*. (2)
- Railways, SNCF, Electrification of the North-Eastern Railway, Bronze Medal, 1955, by Belmondo, a new electric powered locomotive speeds past an industrial landscape, *rev* two workers clasp hands, 67.5mm. *Extremely fine*.

Germany

1830 Lucretia, by Albrecht Dürer (1471-1528), 1508, a Restitutional Medal in tin/pewter, her head and shoulders, turned three-quarters left and tilted, her eyes raised, her hair falling to a lovelock on her right shoulder, 1508 to left and AD monogram to right, rev blank with slight incuse 'ghosted' image, 55mm (M Trusted, German Renaissance Medals, 23-24; Habich I.1, p.3, 14; Weber 700). Very fine, minute piercing.

The medal, formerly described as Agnes Dürer, is a restitution in that it was never made by Dürer, but is in his style. In cataloguing the two V&A specimens, in copper and copper alloy, Trusted sugests that they are the product of the "Dürer Renaissaince" of the early 17th century, based perhaps on Antonio Abondio's Venus and Cupid of his Toilet of Venus, which in turn are based on Dürer drawings.

- 1831 Johann Friedrich, Duke of Brunswick-Luneburg 1669, Bronze Medal, by Giaocchino Travani, draped bust of Johann Friedrich left, *rev* a tall palm tree on rocky ground, 50mm (Brockmann 645). *Very fine and rare.* £200-250
- 1832 Friendship, Silver Medal, c.1790's, by Abraham Abramson, three cocks, *rev* three playing cards within circle, floral wreath around, VEREINT DURCH FREUNDLICHKEIT, 39mm. *Fine and toned*.
- The Peace of Paris, German Box Medal, Tin, 1815, by Stettner, Peace stands in rural landscape, with cornucopia and olive branch, *rev* triumphal arch, EURE THATEN BEWUNDERN MILLIONEN, 50mm (d'E 1647). *Very fine*. £50-70
 - The box lacks any of its usual roundels, but has its original end-pieces with legends within a wreath, *Goldner Fried weil ...*, and *Dank Euch Helden...*.
- Prussia, Friedrich Wilhelm II and Alexander I of Russia, Monument to the Russo-Prussian armies, erected in Berlin, Copper Medal, 1821, by Brandt, conjoined busts left, *rev* monument, 50mm (d'E 1662); Set of Portrait White Metal Medalets (4), 1815, by Loos, each with armorial reverse, Field Marshal Gebhard von Blücher (1742-1819), Field Marshal August, Graf Niedhardt von Gneisenau (1760-1831), Bogislaw von Tauentzien (1760-1824), and Hans David Ludwig York, Graf von Wartenberg (1759-1830), 28mm (Br 1731, 1732, 1733, 1734). *Fine to very fine*. (5)
 - von Tauentzien perhaps best remembered for the battle of Grossbeeren, 23 August, 1813

1839 Franz Joseph, (1848-1916), 1000 Years of the State, diamond-shape [square] silvered medal, 1896, three medallic busts, *rev* cityscape within cartouche, 34mm x 34mm. *Extremely fine, small piercing*.

Italy

- Cardinal Giuliano della Rovere, later Pope Julius II (1443-1503-1513), copper-gilt Foundation Medal for the Fortifications at Ostia, Roman School under Sixtus IV, bust right, wearing cap and cope, IVL. EPISC. OSTIEN, rev view of the city and port of Ostia, CARD. S.P. AD. VINC, both legends commence with a rosette of dots, 36mm, on relatively thick flan, 3.5mm-4mm (Barg I, 184; Arm II, 110/3 & III, 201, a). The medal very fine, the gilding original and applied to both sides and the edge, rubbed in high spots, very rare.
 - The Fortifications were commissioned by della Rovere and the work commenced in 1483. della Rovere was made a Cardinal in 1471 and before his election to Pope was, variously, Bishop of Lausanne, Avignon, Coutances and Mende
- Vatican, Gregory XIII, *Boncompagni* (1572-1558), Copper Medal, undated, by Gianfederico Bonzagna, bearded bust right, wearing embroidered cope, *rev* interior of the Gregorian Chapel in the Vatican, GREGORIANA. D. NA..., 39mm (Lincoln 672). *Nearly extremely fine*. £250-300

The Gregorian Chapel was built to Michaelangelo's designs to hold the remains of St Gregory of Nazianzus (d.390), and is noted for its lavish beauty and use of coloured marbles and stones. The image of the Virgin Mary above the altar can be made out on the medal.

- 1843 Christoforo Madruzzo (1512-1578), Prince Bishop of Trent, Bishop of Brixen, Cardinal (1542) and Governor of Milan (1556-1557), cast Copper Complimentary Medal, undated, by Pietro Paolo Galeotti, bearded bust left wearing loose coat, *rev* harbour with seven ships, its entrance guarded by Neptune, 41.5mm (Att 830 [this with legend TRANQVILL on the reverse]; Kress 353; Arm I, 231, 17). *An early aftercast (from a pierced example), very fine.* £70-90

The reverse design derived from a Sestertius of Nero showing the harbour at Ostia

Attila, King of the Huns (434-453), a small 16th Century oval and uniface cast Bronze Medallic Plaquette, Northern Italy, after the Antique, a Pan-like bearded bust right with goats horns in his hair and an animal skin knotted to the front, 44mm x 36mm (Att 1229). *An excellent impression of this fanciful portrait, very fine, and the reverse showing signs of the (now smoothed) casting sprue.*£80-120

Perhaps originating from Pavia where a carved medallion with a similar portrait is recorded. The footnote in Attwood gives plenty of further information.

Vatican, Innocent IX, *Facchinetti* (1519-1591-1591), small Bronze Medal, year 1, by Nicolò Bonis, bearded bust right wearing cope fastened with an angel brooch, *rev* crossed keys within floral wreath, IVSTITIA. ET. PAX. OSCVLATA. SVNT, 30mm (Arm I, 289, 15; L 834). *Very fine*. £70-90

Innocent IX was Pope for just two months, but he is remembered as the Papal Nuncio sent by Paul V to Venice where the alliance between the Vatican, Venice and Spain and against Turkey was established. He returned to Rome in 1572 following the victory at the battle of Lepanto.

Alexander The Great, an oval cast Bronze Plaquette, 17th century, "after the antique", a classical bust right, in armour with decorated breast-plate, a mantle around his shoulders, and wearing an Athenian helmet with wreath around and topped with a fantastical dragon-like creature, 131mm x 102mm, the reverse cast with a clear incuse image. *Very fine with small piercing at the bottom, and a dark, aged patination.* £200-300

The origin of this piece is a small early 16th century Florentine oval bronze plaquette, with a similar bust and the inscription ALISANDRO (Kress, Bronzes, 261, fig 53), which in turn derives from a slightly smaller plaquette of Minerva (Kress, Bronzes, 259, fig 49). Both are catalogued as "After the Antique". The same image was adapted by Travani and others on portrait medals of Queen Christina of Sweden.

Venice, The Alliance between the United Provinces and Venice, Silver Medal, 1620, by Willem van Bylaer, struck at Dordrecht, the crowned lion of the Provinces, with sword and arrows, FOEDVS. INITVM., rev the lion of St Mark [of Venice], over land and sea, holding shield, 58mm (vL II, 127/128; Voltina II, 885; Serenissima II, 15). A splendidly visual medal, extremely fine and rare.

Talks were started under the auspices of Doge Antonio Priuli (1618-1623), between Venice and the United Provinces leading to an understanding that, should either be attacked, the other would come to their assistance. The Treaty was signed on the 31st December, 1619 and solemnly ratified the following year, when Ambassadors were exchanged and medals were distributed to important members of the retinues. It is recorded that van Bylaer received payment of 90 Florins for the two dies.

Erasmus was born Gerrit Gerritszoon, adopting his Latin name later

- Margaret of Austria (1522-1586), Duchess of Parma, Governor/Regent of the Netherlands (1559-1567), Departure from the Netherlands, Lead Medal, 1567, by Giuliano Giannini, bust right, wearing a gown adorned with pearls and small ruff, *rev* Peace stands on rock repelling the winds, A. DOMINO. FACTVM. EST. ISTVD., dated below, 34mm (cf Att 1103; Arm 11, 211.41). *Very fine*.

Margaret of Austria was the illegitimate daughter of Charles V and Margaret van Gent, she married (1) Alessandro de Medici (1536-1537) and, following his assassination (2) Ottavio Farnese (1538)

- 1857 Fernando Alvarez de Toledo (1507-1582), Duke of Alba and Spanish General, cast Bronze Medal, 1568, by Giuliano Giannini, bearded bust right, wearing ruff, rev Minerva in her chariot drawn by two owls crowned by a diminutive Victory, whilst flowers cascade down, RELIGIONEM. ET. OBEDIENTIAM. REDINTEGRAVIT, 36mm (Att 1104, silver; Arm II, 246, 9 & III, 140A; Kress 639; vL I, 123; Smolderen p.316). Very fine and scarce. £120-160
- 1858 Alessandro Farnese (1545-1592), Governor of the Netherlands and Duke of Parma, the siege of Maastricht (1579), Lead Medal, c.1585, by Giulano Giannini, bust left wearing armour, rev a plan of Maastricht, under siege, 41mm (Att 1105; vL I, 265; Arm I, 291.2). Perhaps once lacquered, good fine.

- Philippe de Croy (1526-1595), Duc d'Arschot, Prince de Chimay and Diplomat, aged 69, cast Copper Medal [1595], from the circle of de Jonghelinick, bust right, wearing ruff, and Badge of the Golden Fleece on ribbon over armour, *rev* a hand raises a beehive and bees fly around, arms above, motto on ribband, DVLCIA MIXTA MALIS, and legend, DE. PORCEAN CONTE. DE. BEVMONT SENINGHEM, 35mm, cast with small integral suspension loop (with small cut) (Smolderen E.16; vL I, 450; BDM I, 198, by Bloc). *A pleasing medal, very fine*. £120-150

There is a larger medal of a younger Philippe de Croy by de Jonghelinick and dated 1567 (Smolderen 55). This has a variation of the beehive reverse which is probably the inspiration for the reverse of the medal now offered.

The questionable decision of the Governor-General van der Wijck to mount a military operation under General Vetter for the so-called Pacification of Bali seemed to go to plan until there was a sudden uprising which left over 250 people killed or wounded – the worst 19th century military disaster for the Netherlands.

- Maria I (1777-1786-1799), and Pedro III (1777-1786), Foundation Medal for the Igreja do Santissimo Coração de Jesus, Copper Medal, 1779, unsigned, conjoined busts right, reads PORTUGALIAE (not Æ), rev legend in ornate cartouche, SANCTISSIMO. CORDI ..., 47mm (Lamas 60). Very fine and a pleasing double portrait medal. £120-150
- 1866 John VI (1767-1799-1816-1826), Acknowledged Regent by the City of Porto, Silver Medal, 1799, by Jean de Figueredo, signed FIG, the Regent stands between draped columns, wearing cloak, etc, offering his hand to personification of Porto, who kneels before him, rev legend in seven lines IOANNI PORTVG. ET ALGARB ..., 55mm (Lamas pl.22, 79). Nearly extremely fine, an attractive composition. £300-350

The race was won by the Belgian, Ernest Demuyter, flying with his co-pilot and radio operator Hoffmans, and Demuyter's 5th win in his 16th race. His balloon BELGICA was in perfect condition with a yellow silk envelope. After flying for 28 hours they flew over Moscow and followed the river Volga. The balloon finally landed South-East of Archangel after a flight of 46½-hours, during which they reached a maximum height of 6,200 metres. They landed in stormy weather in the tundra and were lucky to bring the balloon down undamaged. The Americans, wary of the political situation in Europe, did not send a team.

The medal [the V&A specimen] is most recently published by Susan Spinale, "Re-assessing the so-called 'Tricaudet Medal' of Mehmed II", *The Medal*, Spring 2003, pp.3-22, fig.3. The 'R' stamp is the mark of Robert or Augustus Ready, electrotypists at the British Museum. A uniface example of this medal is being offered in our Islamic Coin Auction 8, lot 476

- 1892 1565, Jean Parisot de la Valette (1494-1557-1568), The Termination of the Siege of Malta, small Silver Medal, unsigned, Victory stands on the deck of a war galley, holding up a wreath, MELITA. LIBERATA., rev knight on horseback to left, brandishing his sword and trampling on military trophies, TVRCA. FVGATO, 28mm (Schembri 229/2, described from an example in bronze listed as "unique"; vL I, 69.1; Feuardent III, 13731). Nearly extremely fine, however some tooling in the fields, excessively rare in silver.
 - The 'Great Siege' lasted four months, after the invasion of Malta by some 35,000 troops fom a fleet of 180 galleys. The 9,000 Knights Hospitalier under the leadership of the 70 year old de la Valette, held the city and harbour of St Elmo, until further troops arrived from Sicily and the Turkish troops abandoned not only the siege, but also any further hope of extending the Ottoman Empire further to the West.  - This annual medal was issued on June 29^{th} , 1716 and commemorates the continued offensive against the Turks by invoking the aid of the Virgin against them. The rosary She holds is believed to be a reference to its miraculous assistance at the Battle of Lepanto. In addition the Victory of Prince Eugène at the Battle of Peterwardein in Hungary, where Sultan Mustapha II and his force of 30,000 Turks were defeated, was fought on the 5^{th} August, 1697, the feast day of Our Lady of the Snow. On the medal the Pope is wearing a cope where the embroidery shows him, together with his retinue, calling down avenging angels against his enemies.

A choice medal, lightly toned and virtually as struck, very rare.
- 1909 1717, The House of Hapsburg, Charles VI (1711-1740), Victories againt the Turks, Silver Medal, by G W Vestner, laureate bust right, withn full flowing hair, *rev* an equestrian statue of the Emperor, between two columns marked PLVS and VLTRA, bound prisioners by each, chronogrammatic date in exergue legend, TVRCARVM DE GENTE VICTORI, 43.5mm (Weifert pl.VII, 57; Julius 1308; Bern 113). *Extremely fine and very rare*. £700-900

- 1910 1717, The House of Hapsburg, Charles VI (1711-1740), Capture of Belgrade, Silver Medal, by Philip (II) Roettiers, laureate bust right, signed R, rev an eagle, a crescent in its claws, flies above a lion with two cubs, attacking a dragon, 33mm, suspension loop (Mont 1518; Weifert pl.VI, 53, 54; Julius 1301). Good very fine, very rare.
 - The medal is also known in a larger, 44mm, size (vL supl. I, pl II, 16; Baldwins' Auction 33, May 2003, lot 1404)
- 1911 1717, The House of Hapsburg, Charles VI (1711-1740), Capture of Belgrade, Bronzed White Metal Medal, by Martin Brunner, laureate bust right, wearing armour and Collar and Badge of the Golden Fleece, *rev* the victorious armies massacre the fleeing Turks, TRADIDIT DOMINVS IN MANVS ..., 43mm (Mont 1511; Weifert 30; Julius 1287). *Very fine*. £220-240
- 1912 1774, Russia, Catherine II, the Great (1772-1796), Peace with Turkey, Campaign Medal, lozenge-shape, a striking in copper, by S Judin, bust of the Empress right, *rev* legend within wreath and continued below, 38mm x 31mm (Reichel 2520; Smirnov 277; Werlich 49b, c; Vernon 160). *A little weak, nearly extremely fine.*
 - The medal was awarded in silver to Officers. This, in copper, with no sign of ever having a suspension loop, might be considered a commemorative striking.

 - The Battle of Foksan and the subsequent Battle of Boze, between the combined Russian and Austrian armies against the Turks led to the Austrian occupation of Belgrade. Both countries were anxious for a share of the Turkish Crimean territories.
- 1914 1791, Russia, Catherine II, the Great (1772-1796), The Treaty of Jassy, with Turkey, Silver Medalet, crowned monogram within wreath, *rev* legend in four lines, milled edge, 23mm (Werlich 55). *Extremely fine*. £200-220
 - The Treaty of Jassy, signed in December 1791, ceded the Jedisan to Russia and Turkey also accepted the Russian annexation of Crimea
- 1915 1791, Germany, Asmi Achmet, Turkish Ambassador to Berlin, Silver Portrait Medal, unsigned, bearded bust left wearing turban, *rev* legend and date in eight lines, ZUM ANDENCKEN BEY ...1791, 29mm (FuS 4554; Voltolina 1737; Serenissima III, 165). *Extremely fine*. £120-150
- 1916 1791, Germany, Asmi Achmet, Turkish Ambassador to Berlin, Silvered-Bronze Portrait Medal, unsigned, similar to previous lot but from different dies, *rev* legend and date in seven lines, ZUM DENKMAL DES ...1791, 31mm (Voltolina 1738; Serenissima III, 166). *Extremely fine*. £80-100

Good very fine and very rare.
 - In 1807 Foy was sent as Ambassador to Turkey and helped in the defence of the Dardanelles and Constantinople against a possible attack by the British fleet in the Mediterranean. The lid contains a roundel stating "Cet ouvrage se trouve chez Remé Rue Beaubourg No 13", another states "Le souvenir du Député Foy restera dans le coeur des français" and in hand on the reverse "Signo D'amitio", whilst a third explains "Dithyrambe prononcé Sur la tombe du General Foy par M. Viennel", and in hand "souvenir". Jemmapes was fought on the 6th November, 1792. It is said that his funeral was attended by a crowd of 100,000 people.

1920 1829, Russia, Nicholas I (1825-1855), The Capture of Adrianople, Copper Medal, by C Pfeuffer, and Loos, classical warrior with Christian standard, before city wall, *rev* legend within wreath, 39mm. *Minor scuffs and edge nick, nearly extremely fine.* £60-80

Adrianople, the capital of the European Turkey was captured on the 8th August, 1829

1921 1836, France/Egypt, The Obélisque de Louqsor, Erected in the Place de la Concorde, Paris, miniature Silver Medal, unsigned, the obelisk, *rev* legend, 17mm. *Extremely fine and deeply toned*. £50-60

The granite obelisk, 23 metres tall and weighing 230 tons, was presented to Charles X by Muhammad Ali Pasha, and the legend (obverse) gives the dates of its shipment from Thebes (31 October, 1831), and its erection in Paris (25th October, 1836). The reverse notes that it was erected in the reign of Louis Philippe under the direction of the engineer Lebos.

1922 1840, Austria, Archduke Friedrich Ferdinand Leopold (1821-1847), The Capture of Sidon, Copper Medal, by Francesco Stiore [dated 1841 in error], bust left wearing uniform, *rev* a panorama with the frigate *Guerriera* at anchor before the town and small boats landing troops, SIDONE. CAPTA, 50mm (Mont 2596; Würz 2884; MH 466; BDM V, 688). *Choice extremely fine*. £150-180

Friedrich Ferdinand was the son of the Archduke Charles and was a Post-Captain in command of the frigate *Guerriera*. Sidon was stormed by a mixed force of three British steamships, four Turkish corvettes and the *Guerriera*, and was captured after only a few hours, on the 26th September, 1840. Friedrich Ferdinand was later at the capture of St. Jean d'Acre, was promoted Admiral in 1844 and had just been appointed Commander-in-Chief of the navy when he died suddenly.

1923 1841, The Treaty and Convention of London and the Return of Syria to the Porte by Mehmet Ali, Copper Medal, by J B Roth, three figures, a knight [Europe] with Syria and an Ottoman to either side, *rev* shields of Great Britain, Russia, Prussia and Austria linked by wreath, 47mm (BDM V, 223). *Extremely fine, rare*. £150-180

Following the Treaty and Convention of London, Syria was returned to the Porte and Britain, Russia, Prussia, and Austria agreed to limit the expansion of Egypt. The Dardanelles were to be closed to all foreign war vessels in time of peace.

1924 1842, Egypt/Great Britain, Mehmet Ali Pasha, The Overland Route to India Protected, Copper Portrait Medal, 1842, by A J Stothard, bust three-quarters left, full beard and wearing fez, dated on truncation, *rev* legend above palm branches, FROM THE COMMITTEE. THE FRIEND OF SCIENCE ..., 57.5mm (BHM -; BDM V, 696). *Extremely fine*. £200-250

Mehmet Ali Pasha (1769-1849), Governor [Vali] of Misir (elected in 1805), Sudan [which he conquered in 1822-23), Filistin, Suriye, Hicaz, Mora, Tasoz and Girit. Later he occupied Syria 1831-40. He is buried in the Alabaster Mosque in the Citadel in Cairo, the same Citadel where he massacred the Mamluks in 1811. The portrait is from Sir David Wilkie's painting (of the same date) and now in the Tate Gallery.

- 1925 1854, Great Britain/France, The Allied Victory in the Crimea, Copper Medal, by L J Hart, conjoined laureate busts left of Napoleon III and Victoria, *rev* display of Turkish military trophies placed before a mosque, 72mm (Divo 214; BDM II, 435). *Extremely fine*. £250-300
- 1854, Great Britain/France, The Holy Alliance La Sainte Alliance [between Great Britain and France], Copper Medal, by Allen and Moore, from a design by Punch, two uniformed infantrymen, one British, one French, greet each other before cannon, flags and drum, *rev* legend in French within wreath, LA FRANCE ET L'ANGLETERRE UNIS POUR SECOURIR LES OPRIMÉS ET POUR VENGER L'EUROPE INSULTÉ, 44mm (BHM 2537, R; Divo -). *Nicely struck on (6mm) thick flan, extremely fine and the scarce variety with the French legend on the reverse.* £50-70
- 1927 1854, France, World Peace La Paix du Monde, Copper Medal, by A Caqué, and Obert, Napoleon III links hands with Queen Victoria and Abdul Aziz, PROTESTANTISME. CATHOLICISME. ISLAMISME. CIVILISATION, rev legend in ten lines, EN 1854 ..., 36mm (Divo 186; Coll 1661). Nearly extremely fine.
- 1928 1856, Austria, Franz Joseph (1848-1916), Peace Negotiations following the Crimean War, Bronze Medal, 1856, by J B Roth, youthful bust of the Emperor left, in uniform, *rev* winged figure holding cornucopia, stands with the trophies of Peace and War to either side, 45mm. *Extremely fine*. £180-220

1929 1854-56, The Crimea War, a shell cameo, derived from the Crimean War Medal, Roman soldier stands holding a circular shield decorated with a lion passant, in his other hand a sheathed sword in one hand, behind him a flying figure of Victory crowns him with a laurel wreath, below the groundline, CRIMEA, set within an oval gold brooch with decorative leaf details at top and bottom and to either side, 70mm x 59mm. Extremely well carved and in an attractive and expensive period mount.

The reverse of the Crimea medal was designed by Benjamin Wyon (1802-1858) and of all his large output of work it is probably the design for which he is best remembered. Hocking, *Royal Mint Museum Catalogue*, Vol. II, 165, 35, describes the soldier as a "warrior in Greek military dress". The cameo is quite faithful to the medal, though the soldier's face is now more facing, and the lion on the shield has been splendidly exaggerated.

- 1836, The Crimea War, The Peace of Paris, Copper Medal, by Wilhelm Kullrich, and Loos, Europe seated receives a palm branch from the winged figure of Peace seated facing to left, being offered a palm branch by a winged Genius, around are the Heads of the various States, Napoleon III and Victoria at top, Vittorio Emanuele [Sardinia], Alexander II [Russia], Franz-Joseph [Austria], Friedrich Wilhelm IV [Prussia] and Abdul Mejid [Turkey], rev legend in six lines, PAX CONCILIATA LUTETIAE ..., 56mm (Divo 308; Pax 811; Weyl 2653). Choice extremely fine.
- 1869, Egypt, Khedive Ismail Pasha (b.1830-1863-1879-d.1895), the Opening of the Suez Canal, French White Metal Medal, bust three-quarters left, wearing fez and badges of two Orders, *rev* panorama of the canal showing several ships, Arabic legend around, 37mm, integral suspension loop (Peltzer 2485). *Very fine*. £100-150

Ismail Pasha (Khedive from 1866), had made Egypt wealthy from the sale of cotton during the American Civil War, however the wealth was mis-managed and in 1875 he sold his holdings – about 44% - in the Suez Canal to the British Government. The Ottoman Empire replaced him with his son in 1879 following his failure to control the British and French debt commission.

1881, Romania, Carol I (1866-1881-1914), Proclamation as King, large Copper Medal, by W Külrich, bearded bust left, in uniform and bemedalled, *rev* a symbolic figure holds wreath and shield, a frieze-border of scenes around of incidents in the Russo-Turkish War, 85mm (BM Guide, 1924 [Hill], 99; BDM III, 245). *Good very fine, the high-spots a little bruised*. £250-300

Romania was of considerable help to Russia in the war, especially at the Siege of Plevna, where Carol commanded the allied forces

1933 1892, Austria, 360th Anniversary of the Liberation of Waidhofen an der Ybbs from the Turks, Silver Medal, by Wilhelm Pittner, heraldic gateway, *rev* a highly detailed panorama of the city, WAIDHOFEN 1532 above, ... BEFREIUNG DER STADT VON DEN TÜRKEN, 51mm (Würz 9212, Æ). *Small maker's stamp on edge, nearly extremely fine, very rare*. £250-300

The firm of W Pittner is best known as the manufacturer of the commemorative medal for the 1896 Olympic Games

1897, Romania, Carol I (1866-1881-1914), Inauguration of the Monument at Ploesti, to the Russian-Turkish War, 1877-1878, Copper Medal, by Carniol, bearded bust left, in uniform and bemedalled, *rev* view of the monument, with legend and dates around, 65mm (Würz 4359). *Somewhat scuffed, good very fine.*

The Ploesti oil-fields were to be a major theatre in the Second World War

1935 1901, Romania, Mihai Viteazul, Michael the Brave (1558-1593-1601), the 300th Anniversary of his Assassination, Silver Medal, by the Numismatic Society of Romania, bearded bust three-quarters right, wearing plumed fur hat, rev seal over legend, 50mm (Würz 6284). Struck with a darkly patinated matt surface, edge stamped "1000", extremely fine.

Michael the Brave was created Prince of Wallachia in 1593, Prince of Transylvania in 1599 and of Moldavia in 1600. He was part of the Christian League formed to unite against the Ottoman Empire. After the battles of Calugareni and Giurgiu he was finally able to unite the country, but both he and this unity were to be short-lived as he was assassinated in 1601. The obverse is taken from a well-known and much published portrait.

He worked in Glasgow, being employed by the Caledonian Tube Company. His connection with military matters began in 1890 when he joined, as a second lieutenant, the Glasgow Highlanders, previously known as the 5th Volunteer Battalion, Highland Light Infantry. He was raised to the rank of captain on enlisting. He was killed in action in an attack on German trenches at Rue du Bois, near Le Tarret, France on May 15th, 1915 and was buried in the cemetery near Le Tarret Bridge.
