Parthian

Unlike most Parthian coins, here the king's personal name appears in Greek. Vonones I enjoyed a temporary victory over Artabanus II who would in time claw back victory, and force Vonones to flee to Armenia where he secured the throne in about AD 12. Artabanus' continued attempts to remove him from Armenia were eventually successful and Vonones fled to Syria where he was kept by the Romans, but was later moved to Cilicia at Artabanus' request, and was murdered circa AD 19.

Little is known about the history of Elymais, a semi-independent kingdom once located in the foothills of the Zagros mountains, between Susa and the northwest of Persis, at the head of the Persian Gulf, between Babylonia and Persis. Today this area forms part of south western Iran. After a short period of independence under Kamnaskires I, Elymais was conquered by the Parthians, after the battle of Apamea in 188 BC. In the political upheaval that followed the death of Mithradates II, Kamnaskires II was able to restore Elymean independence, and founded a dynasty that would last until c.AD 100. Elymais finally lost its independence to Ardashir I in AD 227.

The obverse field of this coin contains the name of an otherwise unknown Abbasid heir, *ahmad / bin amir al-mu'minin*. The name of the recognised heir, Abu'l-Fadl, appears on the regular Abbasid coinage between 327 and 329h. al-Radi's precaliphal name was Abu'l-'Abbas Ahmad. Is it possible that the otherwise unknown client of the caliph (*mawla*) *Baldu* (which, because it is in unpointed script, could be read as *nalku* or *yaldu*), gave confusing instructions to the mint, which placed this otherwise impossible legend on the obverse? Certainly Ardabil was in a state of great confusion at this time; Muflih al-Yusufi died in 323h, an otherwise unknown 'Abdullah b. Mahfuz struck a dirham in Ardabil in 324h, and Daysam b.
