The medal is, in itself, of interest as it records the terrible crossing of the North Sea, when the King transferred to a small boat in order to land, but was unable so to do for 24 hours on account of the appalling weather conditions. He was indeed met at the shore by a horseman who, with another, got everyone to the shore. This is a very early example of a medal being used as a present (for a child's first birthday and suitably inscribed), only 19 years after it was issued. Moses Raper was the Lord of Thorley Hall Manor and died in 1748. His Memorial, also commemorating his wife Martha, who pre-deceased him in 1725, is in the Church of St. James the Great, Thorley. The House was left to his brother Matthew who passed it the same year to his son, also Matthew, a Fellow of the Royal Society who had an observatory built at the house by John Smeaton (of Eddystone Lighthouse fame). William was to marry and have six children, one son (inevitably Matthew) and five daughters. He died in 1791 and the text of his Will is included in the lot.

- 3235\*** James III, the Old Pretender, and Princess Louisa (1692-1712), Copper Medal, 1812, by Norbert Roettier, bust of each to left, he laureate, she with hair over both shoulders, 30mm (MI 389/243, illustrated; Woolf 25:1a). *Very fine, rare.* £80-120

The medal believed to be a memorial to Princess Louisa Maria Theresa Stuart the youngest daughter of James II and Mary of Modena who had died at St Germain on the 18<sup>th</sup> April, 1712. She was born in exile after the defeat of the French at the Battle of La Hogue, and became known as 'La Consolatrice'. She has been called 'the brightest ornament of the Stuart family', and her death from smallpox was a severe blow to the Jacobite cause.

#### George II

- 3236\*** The Concord of Holland, England and Germany, a Dutch Silver Medal, 1746, by Martin Holtzhey, Hollandia stands with spear and shield, *rev* flags placed over urns from which flow three rivers, the Rhine, the Thames and the Scheldt, 26mm (MI 619/291; vL suppl. XXII, 207). *Extremely fine and rare.* £80-120

#### George III

- 3237** George III, Marriage to Princess Charlotte of Mecklenburg-Strelitz, Silver Medal, 1761, by J Kirk, conjoined busts right, he laureate, *rev* Eros stands by altar, 36.5mm (BHM 10), *very fine*; and a Brass Coronation medalet, 1761, 23mm (BHM 56), *extremely fine.* (2) £60-80

- 3238\*** Visit of Prince and Princess of Wales to Frogmore, Silver Medal, 1795, by C H Kuchler, conjoined busts right, *rev* FROGMORE MAY 19<sup>th</sup> 1795 in three lines, wreath below, 47mm (BHM 401). *Extremely fine.* £100-120

- 3239\*** Nelson, Boulton's Trafalgar Medal, Pewter, 1805, by C H Kuchler, uniformed bust of Nelson left, *rev* panorama of the battle, 47.5mm (BHM 584; MH 496; Pollard 30). *Only fine.* £80-120

The surface of the medal seems to indicate that it might be a contemporary cast, but it retains a lettered edge and even a trace of an engraved name, perhaps "Clarke".

- 3240\*** The Peace of Paris, Silver Medal, 1814, unsigned, cornucopiae and oak branch crossed, TO COMMEMORATE THE PEACE CONCLUDED, *rev* Britannia seated on a globe, WE ACKNOWLEDGE THY BOUNTY, 43mm (BHM 820; Bramsen 1435; Julius 2967 [white metal]). *Bright very fine and rare.* £100-150

#### George IV

- 3241\*** Coronation, hollow Copper Medal, 1821, by T Webb, made from two clichés joined by a brass rim, bust with head turned left, *rev* crown resting on plinth, 54mm, the rim with suspension loop and ring (BHM 1094). *Very fine.* £40-60

#### Victoria

- 3242\*** Visit to Antwerp, Copper Medal, 1843, by L J Hart and Verachter, bust of the Queen left, her hair tied back, *rev* crowned shield of the City arms within wreath, 54mm, 54mm (BHM -). *An attractive portrait, good very fine.* £100-150

**3243\*** Visit to Ireland, Silver Medal, 1849, by J Taylor, conjoined busts of Victoria and Albert left, *rev* legend in seven lines, crown above, 38mm (BHM 2332). *About extremely fine, very rare.* £200-250

**3244\*** Exhibition of Art Treasures, Manchester, Inaugural White Metal Medal, 1857, by Messrs Pinches, façade of the exhibition building, *rev* the three Muses, seated amidst artistic trophies, 63mm (BHM 2605; Allen MA-035), contained in its original brass case with arms of Manchester and Pinches's name and address details (this Allen MA-05). *Mint state.* £70-90

The exhibition was opened by Prince Albert on the 5<sup>th</sup> May, 1857 and had attracted more than 1,335,000 visitors by the time it closed in October.

**3245\*** The International Exhibition 1862, Souvenir Medal, White Metal, by Ottley, Gothic bust left, *rev* Victory over Exhibition façade, 53mm (BHM 2735; JT 182o). *Choice, virtually as struck.* £60-80

**3246\*** Dr David Livingstone (1813-1873), Scottish missionary and explorer of Africa, Memorial Medal, 1873, by Allan Wyon, bust three-quarters right, *rev* group of classical figures, 43mm (BHM 2959). *Extremely fine.* £140-180

**3247** The Visit of the Duke and Duchess of York to the City of London, Copper Medal, 1893, by G G Adams, conjoined busts left, *rev* the couple in antique biga greeted by Londonia, 77mm (BHM 3452; Welch 25). *Extremely fine.* £180-220

400 specimens struck

The Duke of York (later George V) married Princess May of Teck on the 6<sup>th</sup> July, 1893, in the Chapel Royal at St. James's Palace. They visited the City of London later the same day.

**3248** Coronation and Jubilee Medals (4), Victoria, Diamond Jubilee, 1897, Silver, 26mm, veiled bust left, *rev* bare young head portrait (BHM 3506), *good very fine*; King Edward VII, Coronation Medal, 1902, large Copper, bust of Edward VII right, *rev* bust of Queen Alexandra right (BHM 3737), *light scratches in field, very fine*; Coronation 1902, Silver, 31mm, similar (BHM 3737), *extremely fine*; George V Silver Jubilee 1935, silvered Copper 39mm, conjoined busts of George V and Mary, *rev* facing bust of Britannia holding trident (BHM 4267), *extremely fine.* (4) £40-60

#### Masonic

**3249** A group of jewels and badges, including Chapter medal, glazed and with 9ct gold rim; War Service 1914-18; others (8), mostly gilt-metal and enamel Steward's badges and tie clip; small 9ct fob jewels (2) together with brasses and a ceremonial quarry tool. *Very fine and better.* (lot) £120-150

#### Education

**3250** Oxford, All Souls' College, Quincentenary 1938, Silver Medal, struck by the Royal Mint, Seal of the College, *rev* college arms dividing dates 1438 and 1938, 58mm, in box of issue (BHM 4390). *Almost as struck with matt surface, rare.* £60-80

129 specimens struck

A pencilled inscription in the box reads, "This All Souls Commemorative medal struck in 1938 belonged to Kenneth Bell, Fellow of All Souls and Balliol. It was given to me by Sally Bell 1963. R.W.S." Kenneth Bell, a well-known Oxford academic (d.1951).

#### Sport

**3251\*** The Olympic Winner's Medals won by Romuald Klim of the USSR, for Throwing the Hammer

a) Tokyo Olympics 1964, Winner's Gold Medal for Athletics, in Silver-gilt, by The Japanese Mint from Giuseppe Cassioli's design, Victory holds aloft the olive crown, XVIII OLYMPIAD TOKYO 1964 ATHLETICS, *rev* an athlete, his hand raised, carried on the shoulders of his team members, 63mm, suspension loop and multicoloured ribbon, contained in its original velvet and silk-lined black lacquer case of issue, with TOKYO 1964 logo in gold. *Extremely fine and very rare.*

b) Mexico Olympics 1968, Winner's Silver Medal for Athletics [Throwing the Hammer], Silver, from Giuseppe Cassioli's design, Victory holds aloft the olive crown, XIX OLYMPIADA MEXICO 1968 ATHLETICS, *rev* an athlete, his hand raised, carried on the shoulders of his team members, 63mm, suspension loop with additional foot logo (reverse engraved "lanzamiento del martillo"), and green ribbon, medal 60mm. *Very fine.* £400-500

Romuald Klim's throw of 69.74 meters won him the gold medal at Tokyo, beating Gyula Zsivotzky of Hungary by 65 centimeters, however the situation was reversed in Mexico, when Zsivotzky threw 73.36 metres to win by a mere 8 centimeters. There were 314 gold medals awarded for the entire Tokyo games, whilst for Mexico there were 2,600 silver medals. Giuseppe Cassioli's design was first used at the 1928 games in Amsterdam, artistically the Tokyo Mint's rendition is not very satisfactory.

**Charles II**

- 3252\*** The Peace of Breda, Silver Medal, 1667, by John Roettier, laureate head right, *rev* Britannia seated on shore-line reviews her fleet, FAVENTE DEO, 56mm (MI 535/186). *Several knocks and bruises, fine.* £120-150

The medal famous for the representation of Frances Teresa Stuart (1647-1702), later Duchess of Richmond and Lennox, as Britannia (and Pepys's comment in his diary, 25<sup>th</sup> February, 1667).

**Anne**

- 3253\*** The Expedition to Vigo Bay, Silver Medal, 1702, by J Croker, crowned bust left, legend reads FRA, *rev* panorama of the harbour at Vigo, with the Spanish and French ships burning, 37mm (MI 236/18; MH 120). *Good very fine.* £180-220

The bullion captured provided considerable propaganda with the issuing of the VIGO coinage.

- 3254\*** The Capitulation of the Towns on the Meuse [Maas], Silver Medal, 1702, by J Croker, crowned bust left, *rev* a panorama of the bombardment of Liège, with cannon firing on the city, 37mm (MI 241/26). *Nearly extremely fine with light tone.* £150-200

As well as Liège, captured by Marlborough, the medal commemorates his capture of Venloo, Roermond [Ruremond], and Stevensweert, but importantly also the capture of Kaiserswerth by the Prince of Nassau-Saabrück and the first city to fall.

- 3255\*** The Cities Captured by Marlborough, Silver Medal, 1703, by J Croker, bust of Anne left, her hair tied back, lovelock on her left shoulder, single string of pearls, *rev* Marlborough on horseback, as a classical general, is offered three City keys by kneeling figure, SINE CLADE VICTOR, 42mm (MI 246/35). *Good very fine.* £250-300

The cities captured and commemorated on this medal are Bonn, Huy and Limbourg.

- 3256\*** The Battle of Blenheim, Silver Medal, 1704, by J Croker, bust of Anne left, lovelock on left shoulder, *rev* Britannia seated holding Victory in left hand, a bound captive to right, seated on trophies, 34mm (MI 256/49). *Good very fine with some toning.* £80-100

- 3257\*** The Relief of Barcelona, Silver Medal, 1706, by J Croker, bust of Anne left, lovelock on left shoulder, *rev* panorama of the city and harbour with, above, the sun in partial eclipse, 34mm (MI 280/86). *Good very fine.* £120-150

The besieging French army commenced their withdrawal during the eclipse which was, in fact, a total one. Medallion depictions of eclipses are rare.

- 3258\*** The Battle of Ramillies, Silver Medal, 1706, by J Croker, bust of Anne left, lovelock on left shoulder, *rev* winged Fames hold a map of the conquests in Flanders and Brabant, a distant town in the landscape beyond, 35mm (MI 284/92). *Extremely fine and lightly toned.* £120-150

- 3259\*** The Attempted Invasion of Scotland, Copper Medal, 1708, by J Croker and [reverse], S Bull, bust left, pearls in hair, lovelock on right shoulder, *rev* Britannia protecting a crouching Scotia from the French fleet, to the fore a British ship engages the Salisbury, 39.5mm (MI 316/141; Woolf 21:1; MH 139). *Good very fine.* £70-90

The Salisbury, an English prize, was recaptured with her crew of about 400.

- 3260\*** The Battle of Oudenarde, Copper Medal, 1708, by J Croker, crowned bust of Anne left wearing the Garter Collar, George and Star, *rev* two prisoners bound to a victory column, 44mm (MI 322/148). *Good very fine.* £80-120

- 3261\*** The Capture of Sardinia and Minorca, Silver Medal, 1708, by John Croker, bust of Anne left, *rev* Victory with palm branch and standard stands in a conch shell, Sardinia and Minorca in distance, 39.5mm (MI 329/157). *Scuffed, nearly extremely fine and toned.* £120-150

Sardinia was captured after a bombardment by Sir John Leach, who then, with General James Stanhope (see note to lot 3265), captured Minorca. The French governor, Admiral de La Jonquière, who brokered peace was later imprisoned for his handling of the siege of St Philip's castle, whilst the Spanish killed himself jumping from a window.

**3262\*** The Capture of Tournai, Silver Medal, 1709, by J Croker, bust of Anne left, *rev* Pallas seated holding shield and trophies beside her, TORNACO EXPVGNATO, 39mm (MI 354/190). *Extremely fine and retaining some brilliance.* £200-250

**3263\*** The Battle of Malplaquet, Silver Medal, 1709, by J Croker, crowned bust of Anne left wearing Garter Collar, George and Star, *rev* the French entrenchments in a wood fire on the attacking allied force, Victory flies above, CONCORDIA ET VIRTUTE, 47mm (MI 359/197). *Extremely fine, though minor 'nick' in sky on reverse.* £250-350

**3264\*** The Capture of Douay, Silver Medal, 1710, by J Croker, laureate bust of Anne left, ANNA AVGVSTA, *rev* Victory by column amidst trophies, beyond Belona chases French soldier, 48mm (MI 369/213; vL V, 165). *Good very fine.* £200-250

MI records that although Marshall Claude-Louis-Hector de Villars (1653-1734) had assembled his army and was "very bountiful in threats", he ultimately withdrew and Douay duly surrendered. The garrison was permitted to march out with military honours.

**3265\*** The Battle of Almenara, Silver Medal, 1710, by J Croker, laureate bust of Anne left, ANNA AVGVSTA, *rev* battle scene with cavalry charging, PVGNA EQVESTRIS, 47.5mm (MI 373/218; vL V, 157). *Sometime cleaned, otherwise extremely fine.* £150-200

The medal is unusual in that it depicts a precise and decisive moment in the battle when General James Stanhope (1673-1721, later 1<sup>st</sup> Earl), seizes the bridle of General Amezaga's horse and strikes him with his sword, killing him. General Stanhope's charge, which left 1500 killed or wounded Spanish casualties was, in the words of *Medallic Illustrations*, "impetuous" and "worthy of the warfare of earlier ages".

Stanhope had participated in a number of victories during the War of the Spanish Succession, but he lost to the French at Brihuega later in 1710 and was imprisoned for a year in Spain. His later career was political and he held a number of important posts in government.

**3266\*** The French Lines Passed and the Capture of Bouchain, Silver Medal, 1711, by J Croker, bust of Anne left, ANNA AVGVSTA, *rev* French commander surrenders his sword to Fortune, seated on trophies, the city of Bouchain beyond, 44.5mm (MI 385/237). *Extremely fine and lightly toned.* £200-250

### George I

**3267\*** The Capture of Preston, Copper Medal, 1715, by J Croker, laureate bust of George I right, wearing classical armour, *rev* monument stacked with military trophies, two prisoners bound at either side, 45mm (MI 485/34; Woolf 31:2). *Good very fine.* £70-90

**3268\*** The Naval Action off Cape Passaro, Silver Medal, 1718, by J Croker, laureate bust of George I right, wearing classical armour, *rev* trophies of a naval victory stacked around a rostral column, surmounted by the King as Neptune, 45mm (MI 439/42; MH 150). *Extremely fine and lightly toned.* £220-260

Admiral George Byng (1663-1733), destroyed much of a larger Spanish Fleet and captured Admiral Castañeta. He was one of the few commanders in naval and military history never to fail in any task he was charged with or undertook. George I is reported as saying that he needed no instructions on important missions, for "he knew how to act without any."

**3269** John Churchill, First Duke of Marlborough (1650-1722), Death, Dassier's Medal, Copper, 1722, 41.5mm (MI 457/68); The Duke of Cumberland, The Rebellion Defeated, Copper Medal, 1746, bust right, *rev* a Highlander kneels before a crowned English Lion, 35mm (MI 616/286; Woolf 56:5). *This very fine, first once silvered, fine.* (2) £40-60

### George II

**3270\*** The Second treaty of Vienna, Silver Medal, 1731, by J Croker, laureate head left, *rev* Neptune in his conch shell drawn by four sea-horses, commands the sea and winds to be calm, PRÆSTAT COMPONERE, 47mm (MI 496/39). *Very fine.* £140-180

**3271\*** Admiral Edward Vernon (1684-1757), The Capture of Portobello, Pinchbeck Medal, 1739, half-length figure three-quarters left, holding baton, *rev* six ships in harbour, in exergue, BY COURAGE AND CONDUCT, 37mm (MI pl.CLV, 16; Betts 202). *Nearly very fine.* £80-120

On November 21<sup>st</sup> 1739, Admiral Vernon attacked the 'Iron Fort' at Portobello "with six ships only" and after a short resistance it surrendered. The six ships in the action were HMS *Burford* (flagship), 70 guns, HMS *Hampton Court* (Commodore Brown's ship), 70 guns, HMS *Worcester*, 60 guns, HMS *Strafford*, 60 guns, HMS *Princess Louisa*, 60 guns, and HMS *Norwich*, 50 guns. A seventh ship, HMS *Sheerness*, 20 guns had been deployed to Cartagena as a scout. Washington's home, Mount Vernon is named after him, Colonel Lawrence Washington had been part of the American Colonial force serving under him.

- 3272\*** Admiral Edward Vernon, The Capture of Fort Chagre, Pinchbeck Medal, 1740, half-length figure of Vernon, tree to left, fort and ship to right, A VIEW OF FORY (sic) CHAGRE, *rev* six ships in the harbour at Portobello, five to the right, one left, 37mm (MI pl.CLVII, 11; Betts 280). *Nearly very fine.* £80-120

The bombardment of Fort Chagre (now Chagres), at the mouth of the Chagre River in Panama, lasted from March 22<sup>nd</sup> to the 24<sup>th</sup> when the garrison surrendered. The ships that engaged in the bombardment were HMS *Stafford*, HMS *Norwich*, HMS *Falmouth*, and HMS *Princess Louisa*.

- 3273\*** Admiral Edward Vernon and Rear Admiral Sir Chaloner Ogle (1681-1750), The Capture of Cartagena, Pinchbeck Medal, 1741, full-length figures of Vernon and Ogle vis-a-vis, *rev* two ships sail towards the harbour, this protected by a chain boom, 37mm (MI pl.CLVIII, 4; Betts 318). *Very fine, though scratch-marks on obverse.* £120-150

The attack on Cartagena started on March 9<sup>th</sup> 1741 was the least successful of Vernon's actions. Early successes only led to problems, and after a month sickness at epidemic levels forced a withdrawal, though not before all captured facilities were destroyed.

- 3274\*** William, Duke of Cumberland, The Battle of Culloden, Copper Medal, 1746, by Richard Yeo, bust of Cumberland right, wearing armour, lion skin mantle and Garter George, *rev* the Duke as Hercules, tramples on Discord and raises Britannia, 51mm (MI 613/278; Woolf 55:2). *Very fine.* £60-80

- 3275\*** The Victory at Plassey [1757], Silver Medal, 1758, by Thomas Pingo, for the Society for Promoting Arts and Commerce, Victory holding palm branch, seated on an elephant, *rev* Clive, as a Roman General, presents a Standard to Mir Jaffier [Meer Jaafar], edge plain, 40mm (MI 683/400; Pud 757.1; Eimer, *Pingo* 30). *Sometime cleaned, otherwise extremely fine.* £150-200

The Victory at Plassey on the 23<sup>rd</sup> June 1757, gave India to the British. It was fought following the incident of the infamous Black Hole of Calcutta (June 1756), and Clive was able to replace Surajah Dowlah with the sympathetic Mir Jaffier. Surajah Dowlah's army of 60,000 men was utterly defeated. See also note to lot 3279.

- 3276\*** The Capture of Goree, Copper Medal, 1759, by Thomas Pingo, for the Society for Promoting Arts and Commerce, head of Britannia to left, trident behind, O FAIR BRITANNIA HAIL, *rev* Victory with palm branch and wreath stands on the prow of a ship, GOREE TAKEN, 39.5mm (MI 691/415; Eimer, *Pingo* 12; MH 359). *Extremely fine with much original colour.* £120-150

Goree, in the Cape Verde Islands, had been taken by the French in 1677. The second expedition against Goree was commanded by Commodore Augustus Keppel (1725-1786). The French surrendered after a fierce bombardment, and marines took possession of the garrison. Goree was returned to French control at the conclusion of peace in 1763.

- 3277\*** The Battle of Quiberon Bay [Belle Isle], Copper Medal, 1759, by J Kirk, for the Society for Promoting Arts and Commerce, Britannia seated on a sea-horse, BRITAIN TRIVMPHED HAWKE COMMANDED, *rev* Night and Tempest try to shield France from Britannia, 39.5mm (MI 706/441; MH 364). *Struck on a flan with mottled patination, very fine.* £70-90

As with the battle of Trafalgar 56 years later, Hawke's victory and destruction of the French Fleet under Admiral de Conflans, saved Briain from the threat of French invasion.

### George III

- 3278\*** British Victories in the West Indies, Americas and Europe, Copper Medal, 1762, by Thomas Pingo, bust left, in armour, hair tied in queue, *rev* scales and anchor within serpent border, the several victories and commanders named around, 40mm (BHM 82; Betts 441; Eimer, *Pingo* 27; MH 372). *Struck on a light-coloured flan, nearly extremely fine.* £150-200

- 3279\*** Clive of India, Robert Clive, Baron Plassey (1725-1774), Complimentary Silver Medal, 1766, by J van Nost and [reverse] ? G Gosset, bust three-quarters left wearing magnificently embroidered uniform, periwig, and with Garter Sash and Star, *rev* Fame points to an obelisk inscribed with Clive's achievements, 42mm (BHM 95, R3; Pud 766.1). *A handsome portrait medal, extremely fine and extremely rare.* £250-300

- 3280\*** George Augustus Eliott (1717-1790), later Lord Heathfield, the Great Siege of Gibraltar, Copper Medal, 1782, by Terry (signed TERRY. FEC. LONDON.), bust of Eliott left in uniform with Bath Sash, Star and Badge, *rev* view of ships burning in the harbour, small boats rescuing survivors, VICTRIX IN FLAMIS / VICTRIX IN VNDIS, 42mm (BHM 246; MH 401). *Very fine.* £120-150

- 3281\*** George Augustus Eliott, the Relief of Gibraltar, White Metal Medal, 1783, by J Reich, bust of Eliott right in uniform and tricorn hat, *rev* panorama of the harbour, Spanish batteries and Rock of Gibraltar, with cannon balls flying, 42mm (BHM 254; MH 409). *Struck with usual small copper plug, very fine.* £80-120
- 3282\*** Charles, Marquis Cornwallis (1738-1805), the Defeat of Sultan Tipoo, Copper Medal, 1792, by C H Kùchler, uniformed bust of Cornwallis left, *rev* Cornwallis receives the sons of Sultan Tipoo as hostages, correctly dated MDCCXCII, 48mm (BHM 363; Pollard, NC 1970, no.5). *Nearly extremely fine.* £80-120
- The reverse image after a painting by Mather Brown (1761-1831), "The Departure of the Sons of Tippoo from the Zenana".
- 3283** Richard, Admiral Earl Howe (1725-1799), the Battle of the Glorious First of June, Copper Medal, from Mudie's National Series, 1794, by W Wyon, uniformed bust right, *rev* Neptune in his chariot; with other medals of Admirals from the Series (2), Admiral John Jervis, Earl St Vincent (1735-1823), the Battle of Cape St Vincent, head left, *rev* a flying Genius hurls thunderbolts at Spanish ships; Admiral Sir Edward Pellew, Viscount Exmouth (1757-1833), the Bombardment of Algiers, 1816, by L Brenet and Gerard, uniformed bust right, *rev* Neptune pacifies a sea-horse, all 41mm (BHM 387, 438, 921; 1057. 3, 4, 39; MH 418, 452, 572). *Latter two extremely fine, first nearly so.* (3) £150-200
- 3284** Admiral Adam Duncan, Viscount Duncan (1731-1804), the Battle of Camperdon, Copper Medal, 1797, uniformed bust three-quarters right, *rev* legend in thirteen lines, ... IMMORTAL REMEMBERANCE OF THE BRAVE MEN WHO FELL IN THE ACTION, 37mm; another, from Mudie's National Series, by T Webb and W Wyon, uniformed bust left, *rev* Admiral de Winter surrenders his sword to Duncan (BHM 429, 432 [1057.5]; MH 462-463, 460). *Both extremely fine, the first retaining much original redness and bloom.* (2) £120-150
- 3285\*** Horatio, Admiral Lord Nelson (1758-1805), The Battle of the Nile, Copper Medal, 1798, by T Wyon Sr, uniformed bust three-quarters right, *rev* the engagement, a ship (? HMS *Vanguard*), fires broadsides to ships on either side, 38mm. *Extremely fine.* £200-250
- 3286\*** Sir John Borlase Warren (1753-1822), The Action off Tory Island, Copper Medal, by T Wyon, Sr, uniformed bust three-quarters left, *rev* two ships in close action, 38mm (BHM 456; MH 543). *Extremely fine.* £80-120
- Warren attacked a French squadron off the coast of Ireland, preventing a raid on that country.

She had been returning from fund raising in America for the Berkendael Institute, Brussels, run by her husband, Antoine, and where Edith Cavell was first Matron. Isaac Newton had published that the earth flattened out at the poles and the French Academy of Sciences sponsored two expeditions to prove or deny this and to measure the meridian. The first expedition in 1735 was to Peru, led first by Louis Godin, but later by Charles-Maria de la Condamine. The second, a year later, was to the River Torne in Lapland. And was led by Pierre-Louis Moreau de Maupertuis. Both expeditions confirmed that the Earth was flattened at the poles.

Pierre Puget, baroque sculptor, painter, architect, engineer and naval constructor. Jules Hardouin Mansart, baroque architect, whose Dôme des Invalides in Paris (1706), is considered his most impressive achievement.

Nicolas Poussin was a leader of pictorial classicism in the baroque, spending all but two years of his career in Rome. Le Sueur, who was one of twelve founder-members (1648), of the Académie Royale de Peinture et de Sculpture, certainly studied the works of, and perhaps knew, Nicolas Poussin.

Marie Luisa, daughter of King Charles IV of Spain married Louis of Bourbon-Parma, who was the king of the short-lived Etrurian Kingdom (1801-1803). In 1799 Lucca was joined to the Cisalpine Republic before being made into a dukedom by Napoleon for his cousin Felice Bacciocchi. In 1814 it was occupied by the Neapolitans, then later by the Austrians. In 1817 it was given to Maria Luisa, whose son Carlo Ludovico ceded it to Tuscany in 1847.

### Medals illustrative of both Turkey and the Wars against Turkey, together with others medals of Arabic interest.

Initially the battle went in favour of the smaller Hungarian army, but the arrival of a much larger Turkish force quickly settled the result. The loss of life of both sides was extensive, reported as being some 16,000 on both sides. The medal wrongly ages the king as 30.

Tunis had been well fortified by the Turks and a large fleet was harboured there. The siege at sea was led by Admiral Andrea Doria, then after three weeks the Emperor attacked the fortress on the 10<sup>th</sup> June, 1535, where many French cannon were found inside. Doria captured 82 Ottoman galleys. Charles V was compared to the Roman Emperor Scipio and, like him, earned the title "Africanus".

Andrea Doria, as an Admiral of the Holy Roman Empire, commanded several expeditions against the Turks, captured Corona and Patras, and with Charles V led the siege and capture of Tunis in 1535. Doria was defeated by the Turks at Preveza in 1538, and again with Charles V, was involved with the ill-fated Algerian expedition of 1541. Leone Leoni had been condemned to the galleys for an act of violence against a German goldsmith, only to be released by Doria. This medal, and another with a galley on the reverse, were produced in Genoa in 1541 as a token of thanks.
