
THE STRICKLAND NEVILLE ROLFE COLLECTION



Strickland Charles Edward Neville Rolfe was born in 1789, eldest son of General Neville of the Royal Artillery. He assumed the name and arms of Rolfe by royal warrant in 1837, upon receiving the bequest of the estates at Heacham and Sedgeford, from Edmund Rolfe, a distant relative who had no issue.

Educated at Wadham College, Oxford, BA 1812, MA 1816, he was ordained in 1814 and subsequently became domestic chaplain to the Duke of Kent in 1814 and to the Duke of Somerset in 1825. He was appointed vicar of Heacham in Norfolk in 1838. His first wife, Agnes, was the only daughter of Henry Fawcett, MP for Carlisle. They married in 1814 and had five sons and four daughters. In 1833 he married Dorothy, widow of the Rev TT Thomason, Chaplain to the Honourable East India Company.

It is known that he was an enthusiastic collector of both natural and archaeoalogical items, as well as having a keen interest in art. Rolfe had had a number of artists staying for long periods to study artistic endeavours at Heacham Hall. It is said that he had a large coach

built in which he took these artists on excursions to draw and paint buildings or articles of interest in and around the area. He was especially interested in the area of Norfolk and part of his collection of portraits of Norfolk celebrities, original drawings, topographical and antiquarian, were sold by Sotheby's. Some of these pieces had been used to extra illustrate 'Blomefield's History of the County of Norfolk' (compiled by Francis Blomefield and published in 1805). Later, in 1929, a number of water-colour drawings from the collection were also used to illustrate a publication compiled by his great grandson, Clement Rolfe-Ingleby, and entitled 'A supplement to Blomefield's Norfolk.'

Strickland Rolfe died in 1852. Heacham Hall was destroyed by fire in 1941, whilst being occupied by the RAF.

The numismatic collection has remained in the hands of descendents and represents a snapshot of the tastes and interests of an educated country gentleman and divine. The English coins span three centuries and includes key rarities, such as the pattern "Incorrupta" and "Three Graces" crowns, as well as some rare and interesting coppers. It is amazing to think that the crowns were probably acquired soon after they were issued, which would account for their remarkable state of preservation.

There is an interesting selection of colonial coins including a number of East India Company coins from India and the Far East, as well as St Helena. It would be tempting to think that these may have been gifts from relatives who travelled overseas. We know that his second son, Henry Fawcett Rolfe, served in the Royal Navy, and died in the Far East. Amongst the colonial coins are some superb early American coins, a pewter Continental Dollar, some well preserved Rosa Americana coppers, and a magnificent Virginia halfpenny. There were Rolfes amongst the early settlers in America, notably as successful Virginia tobacco farmers. It was a Rolfe who brought the ill-fated native American Pocahontas to England, but the family assure us there is no direct connection to this line.

Perhaps the most remarkable part of the collection is the series of Norfolk and Suffolk 17th Century tokens. This is a substantial collection of 365 pieces, formed with obvious pride and dedication, as is confirmed by the meticulous notebook kept by Rolfe for the Norfolk part. Whether he drew the astonishing pen and ink illustrations himself, or employed an artist to do them, we will never know. There are numerous rarities for both counties, many in remarkably high grade. The sobering thought is that this collection was completely unknown to the key researchers and cataloguers of this series in the 19th and 20th Centuries, William Boyne (1858), George Williamson (1889) and latterly, Michael Dickinson. The tokens listed in the notebook will be sold with it in one lot, to maintain the integrity of the collection.

1342 James I, Farthings (3), Harrington, type 1a, rev initial mark fret, letter B between sceptres (Peck 29; Everson 3; S 2674), Harrington type 2, rev initial mark lis (Peck 49; Everson 18b; S 2676), Lennox type 3c, contemporary counterfeit, obv initial mark dagger, five stringed harp (Peck 71; Everson C5; S 2679A), toned, very fine, toned, good very fine and very fine; Charles I (1625-1649), Farthing, Richmond type 2 (1c in Peck), obv initial mark estoile, six stringed harp, colon punctuation (Peck 160; Everson 78; S 3183), a little off-centre, very fine; Rose Farthing, type 4b (2f in Peck), initial mark mullet both sides (Peck 345; Everson 202; S 3206), green tone, good very fine but weak in parts. Small verdigris spot in the reverse legend, very fine and very rare.

First nearly very fine, the second cracked due to a punchmark on the reverse, detail fine and distinct, nearly extremely fine, extremely rare. (2)



Charles II (1660-1685), London or Elephant Halfpenny, undated, struck in copper, 11.75g, elephant with curved tusks standing left, plain below, no legend, toothed border both sides, rev struck en medaille, large shield of City arms, St George's cross with upright sword in first quarter, six pointed start below, :LONDON:GOD:PRESERVE:, edge plain (Peck 503, and text). Toned, light striations on the obverse, a bold very fine and rare.

The obverse die was later used on the Carolina and New England Halfpennies circulating in the USA c.1694 in the reign of William and Mary.

These London pieces however belong to the reign of Charles II as they are associated with the Royal Company of Adventurers and the later Royal African Company that supplied gold silver and seemingly copper for the purpose of coinage from Africa, hence the use of the elephant as a design.

Toned, about very fine.

This unusual piece seems connected to that listed by Williamson (17th Century Tokens) as Norfolk 230 which carries a Regal Farthing obverse of King Charles II (1660-1685), the "obverse" side carrying the same inscription as the Norwich City tokens. The "token" we have here in pewter carries the "reverse" of Norfolk 225-228, the Arms of Norwich. This would suggest these pieces were not manufactured in the 17th Century and the date on the Charles II piece must be surely misleading. This would invalidate the footnote in Williamson for the Charles II piece if proven to be true. What is required is further documentary evidence, perhaps a search at the archives of the City of Norwich could shed further light. In fact the City Arms on this piece are a die duplicate of the 1670 issue listed by Thompson and Dickinson in the Norweb Syllloge. Significantly number 3126 is the last in the sequence of dies used, as determined by the authors in their extensive research.

Sergeant James Lefever was born in the parish of St Andrews, Norwich, and attested to serve with the Royal Welch Fusiliers on the 23<sup>rd</sup> of April, 1805, at the age of 25, having previously worked as a labourer. In total Sergeant Lefever would go on to serve with the Royal Welch Fusiliers for nearly 14 years, being discharged at the age of 38.

At the Battle of Waterloo the 1st Battalion RWF fought as part of the Lieutenant General Sir Charles Colville's 4th Division, with Sergeant Lefever serving in Colonel Mitchell's Brigade. While two-thirds of this division were not present at the battle of Waterloo itself, having been deployed as a defensive reserve, Colonel Mitchell's Brigade was charged with the task of holding the extreme right corner of the British line. As the cornerstone of the British line, its task was to defend the flank of the British army, and in the area around Hougoumont they resolutely stood and defended themselves against the attacks of French Infantry, Cavalry and Cannon, as the report of a contemporary soldier of the 23rd RWF recounts. The 1st Battalion suffered a total of 104 noted as killed, missing or wounded from an initial unit strength of 647.

The Waterloo Medal Roll records the name as 'LEFEUER' through a simple typographic error.
