Essais and Piedforts



2001 Republic, Copper Essai Monneron Monnaie de Confiance 2-Sols, Year 1, 1792, by Dupré, Hercules kneeling breaking royal sceptre, owl behind, *rev* pyramid, plain edge, 15.40g, 32mm (as VG 342, but plain edge; Maz 332a; Reynaud 8a). *Extremely fine*. £150-200



2002 Louis Philippe (1830-1848), Bronze Essai 3-Centimes and 2-Centimes, undated (1831-1842), by Domard, first with laureate head right, second with laureate head left, *rev* value over ESSAI within wreath, 6.68g, 4.53g (Gad 115, 95; VG 2800, 2801). *Minor edge faults, residual lustre, both extremely fine.* (2) £250-350



2003 Second Republic (1848-1852), Copper Essai Centime, 1851, by Barre, head of Louis Napoleon left, rev ESSAI DE BRONZE 1851, 1.00g (Gad 85). Some lustre, about extremely fine, rare. £200-300



2004 Second Republic, White Metal Essai 10-Centimes (2), 1848, by Barre and Rogat, 8.42, 8.23g (Gad 218, 239A); Copper Franc, undated (1848), small size, by Barre, 4.38g, 23mm (Gad 456a); Copper Essai 10-Centimes, 1848, by Farochon, 13.94g (Gad 225). First with flecked and slightly curved flan, the Franc good very fine and cancelled, otherwise generally about extremely fine. (4)



2005 Second Republic, Brass Piedfort Essai 5-Francs, 1848, unsigned, capped Liberty head left, *rev* value and date within wreath, edge inscribed + CONCOURS MONETAIRE + PIEDFORT, 55.08g (VG 3096 var; Maz 1385 var). *Extremely fine, rare*.



2006 Third Republic (1871-1940), Cupro-nickel Essai 100-Francs, 19(29), by Bazor, Paris mint, winged head of Republic left, *rev* corn ear between laurel and oak branch, reeded edge, 3.53g (Gad 5238; cf KM 880). *In NGC holder graded MS65, minor spots on reverse, very rare.* £800-1000



Third Republic, Cupro-aluminium Essai 100-Francs, 1929, by Bazor, *obv* ESSAI, 3.42g (Gad 1148); Nickel Essai TM '2', and TM '1', undated (late 19th Century), by Theodore Michelin (Gad 259.2, 259.1); Provisional Government, Aluminium Essai 5-Francs, 1945, by Lavrillier, 3.89g (Gad 145.1). *First with small reverse spot, the TM '1' with reverse spots, otherwise generally about extremely fine or better.* (4) £250-300



Third Republic, Silver Piedfort Essai 20-Francs, 1929, by Turin, *rev* ESSAI, plain edge with incuse stamp ARGENT, 40.04g (Gad 199.EP). *Light tone, almost mint state and extremely rare, only 29 struck.* £400-500



2009 Third Republic, Cupro-aluminium Essai 20-Francs and 10-Francs, 1929, by Turin, rev ESSAI, grained edges, 17.67g, 8.86g (Gad 199.5, 169.3). Some spots and handling marks on the 20-Francs, mostly on the obverse, otherwise nearly as struck. (2)



Third Republic, Nickel Essai 20-Francs, 1938, by Turin, *rev* ESSAI, without beading on rim, plain edge, 17.44g, 33mm (Gad -; cf Gad 200.2 for grained edge). *About extremely fine with faint traces of concentric 'guide-lines' on each side, exceedingly rare, possibly unique.* £800-1000

Gadoury lists a similar piece with a grained edge and states that there is only one known specimen.

2011 Third Republic, Nickel Essai 20-Francs, 1938, by Turin, *rev* ESSAI, beaded rim, grained edge, 19.80g (Gad 200.3). *Virtually mint state, attractive and very rare.* £1000-1200



2012 Third Republic, Cupro-nickel Essai 20-Francs, 1939, by Turin, rev narrow ESSAI, beaded rim, grained edge, 16.13g (Gad 200.12). Uneven tone on the obverse, slight handling marks, otherwise good extremely fine, very rare.



2013 Third Republic, Silver Piedfort Essai 10-Francs, 1929, by Turin, *rev* ESSAI, plain edge with incuse stamp ARGENT, 19.85g (Gad 173.EP). *Minor marks by eye, good extremely fine, rare.* £350-400

Mintage not recorded, however only 29 of the comparable Essai Piedfort 20-Francs were struck (see Gad 199.EP and lot 2008).



Third Republic, Silver Essai 10-Francs, 1929, by Turin, rev ESSAI, grained edge, polished flan, 10.02g (Gad 169.1). Residual lustre, nearly mint state, toned, extremely rare with only 9 struck. £1800-2200



2015 Third Republic, Nickel Essai 5-Francs, 18(-), Hercules type, by Dupré, plain edge, 20.16g (Gad 132.1). *Good extremely fine, rare.* £400-500



2016 Third Republic, Silver Essai 5-Francs, 1898, matt finish, by Roty, Semeuse type, *obv* ESSAI, raised edge inscription, 25.04g, 37mm (Gad 131.1). *Attractive tone, small spot behind Liberty, nearly mint state and very rare, only 75 struck.* £5000-7000

Third Republic, Silvered-bronze Essai 5-Francs, 1933, by Turin, *rev* ESSAI and cornucopiae within punch below FRATERNITE, grained edge, 5.02g (Gad 140.10). *Good extremely fine, light tone, exceedingly rare with only 2 examples recorded.*£800-1000



2018 Third Republic, Nickel Essai 5-Francs, 1933, by Lavrillier, rev ESSAI, plain edge, 11.92g (Gad 141.7), nearly mint state; another in Cupro-aluminium, 1939, 11.86g (Gad 141.10). Good extremely fine, toned, rare, probably less than 20 known. (2) £600-800



2019 Third Republic, Nickel Essai 5-Francs, 1933, by Lavrillier, rev ESSAI, plain edge, 12.02g (Gad 141.7).

Minor reverse spotting, about extremely fine.

Third Republic, Silver Piedfort 2-Francs, 1898, by Roty, Semeuse type, ARGENT and cornucopiae incuse on plain edge, 17.71g (Gad 111.P2). *A little spotty on reverse, otherwise nearly mint state, toned, rare.* £180-220

Third Republic, Cupro-aluminium Piedfort Essai 2-Francs, Franc and 50-Centimes, 1920, by Domard, plain edges, *obv* ESSAI, 15.89g, 8.05g, 3.95g (Gad 112.PI, 95EP, 82EP). *Generally nearly mint state.* (3) £500-700



2022 Third Republic, Silver Essai 2-Francs, 1920, by Domard, *obv* ESSAI, grained edge, 9.86g (Gad 112.2). *Extremely fine and very rare, estimated that only 40 exist.* £600-800



Third Republic, Silver Piedfort Essai 2-Francs and Franc, 1927, by Roty, Semeuse type, ARGENT ESSAI incuse on plain edges, 20.04g, 9.95g (Gad 111.EP1, 94.EP). Attractive toning on the obverses, particularly the 2-Francs, a little uneven on reverses, generally about as struck. (2)

Third Republic, Cupro-aluminium Essai 2-Francs and Franc, 1931, by Morlon, *rev* ESSAI, plain edges, 7.88g, 3.91g (Gad 113.6, 97.1). *Light obverse spots, otherwise extremely fine or better.* (2) £150-200



2028 Third Republic, Maillechort (Nickel-silver) Essai Franc, 1920, by Domard, *obv* ESSAI, grained edge, 4.44g (Gad 95.9). *Mint state*. £250-300



Third Republic, Cupro-aluminium Essai 50-Centimes, 1921, by Domard, *obv* ESSAI on obverse, DOMARD to left of date, grained edge, 1.95g (Gad 82.3). *Nearly mint state / good extremely fine.* £200-250



Third Republic, Maillechort (Nickel-silver) Piedfort 25-Centimes, 1904, by Patey, MCHORT and stamp incuse on edge, 22 sided edge, 9.91g (Gad 62.P1), about extremely fine; Aluminium Essai 10-Centimes, 1909, by Rude, rev ESSAI, plain edge, 1.99g (Gad 35.5), almost mint state. (2) £200-300



2031 Third Republic, Nickel Essai 25-Centimes, 1913, by Lindauer, small size, MES underlined, ESSAI within C, 3.03g (Gad 77.2). *Nearly mint state, rare.* £600-800



Third Republic, Nickel Essai 25-Centimes (2), 1914, by Pillet, cockerel and rising sun, *rev* Liberty cap on fasces, two sizes, 5.08g and 3.04g (Gad 73.7, 73.8). *Almost as struck.* (2) £400-500



Third Republic, Nickel Piedfort Essai 25-Centimes, 1914, 10-Centimes, 1914, and 5-Centimes, 1920, small size, by Lindauer, all ESSAI within C, first two with MES underlined, 9.91g, 8.02g, 3.95g (Gad 77EP, 39EP, 19EP). Extremely fine or better, the 10-Centimes rare. (3)



Third Republic, Maillechort (Nickel-silver) Essai 25-Centimes, 1914, by Lindauer, MES underligned, ESSAI within C, 3.92g (Gad 77.9); Cupro-nickel Essai 5-Centimes, 1920, by Lindauer, small size, ESSAI within C, 1.99g (Gad 19.2), some very minor handling marks, otherwise nearly mint state; with Error Strikings, Cupro-nickel 10-Centimes, 1921, and 5-Centimes (2), 1921, 1923, with off-struck central holes (Gad 286, 170, note). Generally very fine to extremely fine. (5)



Third Republic, Maillechort (Nickel-silver) Essai 25-Centimes, Bronze-nickel Essai 10-Centimes and Cupro-nickel Essai 5-Centimes, all 1938, by Lindauer, ESSAI in relief within C's, dates divide dots, 4.04g, 3.09g, 1.55g (Gad 78.3, 40.3, 19.11). Some spotting, generally extremely fine. (3) £300-400



Third Republic, Zinc Essai 25-Centimes, 1940, by Lindauer, as the currency issue but in zinc with fine graining on edge, 3.49g (as Gad 78.8 (4.00g), but to the weight of Gad 78.9 (3.50g) with coarse graining).

Much original colour, good extremely fine and exceedingly rare

Gadoury states that there are 2 known specimens each of 78.8 and 78.9

Third Republic, Bronze Essai 10-Centimes, 1897, by Daniel-Dupuis, matt finish, head left, wide rim on obverse, ESSAI incuse on plain edge, 9.87g (Gad 30.4). *Extremely fine, very rare.* £2000-2500



Third Republic, Bronze Essai 10-Centimes, 1898, by Daniel-Dupuis, matt finish, ESSAI in relief on shield, plain edge, 10.08g (Gad 34.8), good extremely fine; Aluminium Essai 5-Centimes, 1908, by Daniel-Dupuis, matt finish, ESSAI in relief on shield, plain edge, 2.03g (Gad 14.18), slight obverse handling mark, otherwise good extremely fine, rare in high grade. (2)

Centime nearly extremely fine, the others extremely fine or better. (4) £400-500

Generally referred to simply as 'Piedforts', the weights vary considerably compared to the currency issues: the 10-Centimes is 1.5x, the 5-Centimes is 2x, the 2-Centimes is 3x and the Centime is 4x the normal weights.

Fourth Republic, Cupro-nickel Piedfort Essai 100-Francs, 1954, by Cochet, rev ESSAI, plain edge, 11.36g (Gad 230EP1); Fifth Republic, Cupro-nickel-plated-nickel Piedfort 5-Francs, 1971, by Roty, plain edge, 19.97g (Gad 154.P1); Cupro-aluminium-nickel Piedfort Essai 50-Centimes, 20-Centimes and 10-Centimes, 1962, by Lagriffoul & Dieudonné, rev ESSAI, plain edges, 13.25g, 7.58g, 5.81g (Gad 89EP, 56EP, 46EP); Stainless Steel Piedfort Essai 5-Centimes and Centime, 1961, by A de G after Guilleminet, rev ESSAI, plain edges, 6.56g, 3.27g (Gad 21EP, 4EP). Surface marks on the 100-Francs, otherwise generally good extremely fine or better, most rare, only 104 of each struck, except for the 1971 5-Francs. (7)

This Rupee is of the highest numismatic importance and illustrates the value Aurangzeb placed on asserting Mughal authority over Kashmir and the Himalayas. In 1639 Ladakh narrowly escaped total subjugation by Shah Jahan in part by promising an annual tribute. In later years, when Ladakh not only reneged on its promise but also disrupted the Mughal trade route between Kashmir and central Tibet, Aurangzeb threatened invasion again and, reluctantly, the territory submitted to the growing empire. The present Rupee bears the name of the Mughal emperor and the mint but its exact nature is perhaps more complex. Rhodes speculated that the issue may well have been struck independently in Ladakh as tribute, and may then have circulated exclusively in India as propaganda. The issue of this coinage is recorded in the contemporary sources the Alamgirnama, the Maasir-i-Alamgiri and by Khafi Khan II. The low mintage of 1923SA Sovereigns was dictated entirely by the amount of gold brought in to be refined at the Pretoria Mint in its first months of operation. It is known that only enough gold came in to the mint for to a maximum of 719 pieces for currency circulation in the calendar year 1923. However sources vary in their quotes for the actual mintage, with some saying, incorrectly, as few as 64 coins – a figure arrived at by taking the 719 possible total, less the 655 proofs. Marsh quotes a mintage of 406 specimens whilst the 719 figure comes from earlier sources and is later quoted in the South African based publications.

Despite tacitly supporting the Dutch for some time Elizabeth had been reluctant to make her involvement official for fear of offending the Spanish monarchy and risking war. Nevertheless after French and Spanish Catholics joined forces, with the aim of defeating French protestants, Elizabeth accepted the United Provinces' offer of sovereignty and appointed Leicester as *Governor and Captain General of Holland, Zeeland and the United Provinces*. He was ultimately unsuccessful in this role. Although a prominent businessman, he misunderstood the delicate balance of trade between Dutch and Spanish merchants and, in aligning himself with Calvinists, he alienated himself from the provinces' majority moderate Protestants and Catholics alike. At complaints from the states, Elizabeth conferred the command of the armies to Maurice, second son of the late Prince of Orange, during a period while Leicester was absent. On his return he quit the provinces and distributed these medals.

Sir Christopher Wren (1632-1723), architect, scientist and mathematician, cast Bronze Medal, by Gottlieb (George) Daniel Gaab (c.1714-1784), mid 18th Century, bust left, hair long, in buttoned shirt and loose mantle, CHRISTOP WREN EQVES AVR & ACHITECT - OBIIT AD 1723 ÆT 91, rev the West front St Paul's Cathedral, VNVM PRO CVNCTIS FAMA LOQVATVR OPVS – INCEPT AD 1676 / PERFECT AD 1711, with AEDESS PAVLI LOND in exergue and signed G D GAAB SCVLP, rosette stops in legends to both sides, 99.5mm (MI 458/69; Eimer 497; Eidlitz 1073; JT pp.25-26). A superb contemporary example of this extremely rare medal, the images and lettering carefully tooled, extremely fine.

The portrait is a reversal of the ivory bust, carved on an oval, by David Le Marchand (1674-1726), now in the National Portrait Gallery. Gaab exhibited two medallions of Sir Christopher Wren and of St Paul's Cathedral at the Free Society from 5 King's Street, Seven Dials in 1783, marking the 60th anniversary Wren's death. The medal commemorates Wren's greatest achievement, but before this he was a founding member of the Royal Society, had the chair of Astronomy at Gresham College (London) and was later the fourth Savilian Professor of Astronomy at Oxford.



The Rev William Stukeley (1687-1765), Antiquary, "Archdruid" and Freemason, the Famous "Stonehenge Medal" on the Death of Stukeley, 1765, large Copper Medal, attributed to Gottlieb (George) Daniel Gaab (active 1744 - d. 1784), bare head of Stukeley right with a wreath of clover (or, more likely, oak leaves) in his hair, REV GVL STVKEKEY M D SR & AS, æt 54, rev view of Stonehenge, OB MAR 4 1765 / Æ 84, 84mm (BHM 94). Choice extremely fine, light patination and extremely rare.

Stukeley was a Fellow of the Royal Society, the Royal College of Physicians, and the re-formed Society of Antiquaries. The source of the images on both sides of the medal relate directly to Stukeley's most famous book "Stonehenge a Temple Restor'd to the British Druids [&] Abury, a Temple of the British Druids ...", published in 1740. The engraved frontispiece shows the same bust, which is taken, in turn, from a self-portrait, showing him as a Druid, that is now in the British Museum. The reverse, also taken from the book, shows a "Prospect of STONEHENGE from the southwest". It was the late Thomas Stainton who attributed the portrait as after that by David Le Marchand (annotations to his copy of BHM), which is known to have been executed in 1722, when Stukely was 35 – not the 54 shown on the medal. The medal is believed to have been made around 1775, ten years after Stukeley's death. The medallist was certainly confused by Stukeley's age at the time of his death, he died aged 78 and not 84, as shown on the medal's reverse. Daniel Gaab signed only one medal, that of Sir Christopher Wren (see previous lot).

These small medals or tokens were struck (from several dies) for distribution amongst the members of the Council of Bois-le-Duc.

After a portrait by William Marshall Craig and engraved by James Heath. At the school Lawson was referred to as "Millgate's flogging Turk", he always spoke to boys in the third person beginning with the phrase 'Psha, blockhead'. He was however exceedingly caring and the School continued to flourish.

The capture of Belle Isle, off the Brittany coast, was an action of the Seven Years War. An amphibious British landing force captured it after several weeks, but had to return the island to France under the peace terms of the Treaty of Paris in 1763.

The King suffered from mental health problems on several occasions, famously depicted recently in the film *The Madness of King George*. Thomas Gisborne and Henry Revell Reynolds were physicians who attended to him in 1788 and again in 1801.

The Tenantry Column, designed by Charles Harper, was erected as a display of gratitude to the Duke by local tenants and farmers, who had had their rents reduced following the hardships of the Napoleonic Wars. The Duke believed that if the tenantry could afford such a monument they could also afford a return to full rent. This, in turn, led to many being forced into bankrupcy and without the continued subscriptions the Duke was forced to finish the "Farmers' Folly" himself.



2603 London, Matthew Wood, Lord Mayor 1816-1817, Laudatory Bronze Medal, by T Halliday, bust of Wood right with chain of office, *rev* Londinia banishes Conspiracy whilst protecting innocence, 54mm (BHM 956; Eimer 1099). *Good very fine, slight wear to highpoints*. £80-120

This medal refers to the intervention in the trial of three Irishmen convicted of coin forgery in London. After they were convicted it was shown that they were working under duress for their paymasters. They were pardoned and given the financial wherewithal to return to Ireland. Their paymasters were convicted and sentenced to death. Sir Matthew Wood, 1st Baronet (1768-1843) became MP for the City of London from 1817 to 1843.



2604 Scotland, Bronze Special Constable's Badge of the Burgh of Calton, Glasgow, 1817 (30 August), arms of the Burgh of Calton, rev SPECIAL CONSTABLE N° 445, 44.5mm (MG 912). Good extremely fine and rare.

The date on the Badge is that of the granting of the charter of the Burgh of Calton. It was the duty of the Magistrates to see that public-houses were closed at midnight, and on Sundays during the hours of divine service and the first Board of Commissioners enrolled a large number of the burgesses special constables who swore "that we will faithfully discharge the duties of a special constable to the best of our judgement, and as such will give our assistance to the Provost and Magistrates of Calton and to the Sheriff and Justices of the Peace for Lanarkshire in maintaining order, in supporting lawful authority, and preserving the public peace within the district of Calton and Mile-end." By all accounts they were kept pretty busy.



Liverpool, The Liverpool Royal Institution, Silver Ticket or Pass, by T Wyon Sr, numbered 186 on reverse and named to "Sir John Tobin", head of Athena right, *rev* number and name, within wreath, 39mm. *Pierced, nearly very fine*.

Sir John Tobin (1763-1851), was Liverpool merchant, Alderman and, in 1820, Lord Mayor.

Benjamin Arthur Heywood (1755-1828), Banker, the Royal Mechanics' Institution, Manchester, founded 1823, Silver Medal, by William Wyon, bust right, B A HEYWOOD behind, rev façade of the Institution, 50.5mm (BHM 1209, R²; Eimer 1170; JT 111a). Matt surface, obverse with dark tone, very fine, reverse better, very rare.

The Heywood family were Liverpool merchants who later established the bank Heywood, Sons & Co in 1773, becoming Heywood Brothers & Co in 1788. Almost a century later, in 1874, they were acquired by the Manchester & Salford Bank for £240,000, in turn Williams Deacon's Bank, and finally, in 1930, the Royal bank of Scotland.

Benjamin Arthur Heywood was a founder of the Royal Mechanics' Institution and this medal was a prize in his name. It would have been issued in a glazed frame. His son Benjamin Heywood was also a founder of the Institute, serving as its president for 15 years from its foundation until 1840.

The Rev The Hon Edward Lyttelton (1855-1942) sportsman, schoolmaster and cleric. Edward Lyttelton was one of five brothers, all of whom played first-class cricket. Between 1875 and 1882 he played for Cambridge University and Middlesex. Lyttelton played in just one international football for England on 2 March 1878, when they were defeated 7-2 by Scotland. He played for the Old Etonians in the FA Cup Final in 1876 – another defeat.

Lyttelton was headmaster of Éton, 1905-1916, but a sermon he preached in London suggesting that the whole German nation should not be condemned for the War and that any peace settlement should be generous, was to lead to a storm of protest. The medal is dated a couple of weeks before his 40th birthday, the year he was appointed a canon of St Albans Cathedral.

The Holborn Restaurant was opened in 1874 by Frederick Gordon and it was on its success that he was able to establish the Gordon Hotel Group with, amongst others, the Grand Hotel and the Hotel Metropole, both in Northumberland Avenue.

The medal was awarded annually to the cadet at the Royal Military Academy who showed the greatest proficiency in Electricity. James Cotter Roger Fitzgerald-Lombard (1905-1981), was commissioned from the Royal Military Academy, Woolwich, to be a 2nd Lieutenant in the Royal Engineers in 1925 serving, before the War, in India, China and Hong Kong, then during the War, in France, Iceland, France and Belgium. He commanded the Royal Engineers, Sussex and Surrey, 1950-1951 before retiring with the honorary rank of Colonel.

Giovanni di Fondulino Fonduli, formerly known as the Master IO FF (late 15th Century), Horatius at the Bridge, Circular Bronze Plaquette, Horatius on horseback on the central arch of the bridge, repels an attack by three foot-soldiers, behind him two Romans demolish an arch of the bridge, the Tiber flows below, to the right is the Castel Sant' Angelo with flag flying, 54mm (Molinier 137; Bange 660; Kress 100; Fulton fig.7). Small piercing at top, a contemporary cast of good quality on thin flan, light patination, good very fine and extremely rare.

The plaquette is usually found on a shield-shaped flan, suitable for the decoration of a sword-hilt (Wallace Collection, London; Henry Hermann Collection, Morton & Eden, 20 May 2010 (lot 332 - £4,600), this gilt), and Pope-Hennesy [Kress, 1965] states "no circular version known".

Publius Horatius Cocles was an officer in the army of the Roman Republic who defended the Pons Sublicus from the invading army of Lars Porsena in the late 6th Century BC. He is much celebrated in art, writing and poetry.

Vittoria della Rovere was the daughter of Claudia de' Medici and Federico Ubaldo of Rovere. She was promised at the age of one to her cousin Ferdinand II de' Medici and the promise was formalised in 1634. She was married three years later in 1637 and widowed in 1670. She became patroness of the Congregazione di Montalve in 1680.



The Roma carried 1639 passengers. The statue of Roma was a feature in the 'Great Hall' on the ship.

Three Cruises of the TSS *Neptunia*, 1926 to Norway and Spitzbergen, small Silvered-bronze Medal, polar bear on floe with mountains beyond, observes the ship, *rev* crown above legend, suspension loop; France, Société de Topographie de France, founded in Paris, 1875, Silvered-bronze Medal, awarded 1890, to "M Jassy Sergent au 106° de Ligne", crowned shield of arms on flags, *rev* engraved naming within wreath. *First extremely fine, the second very fine.* (2)

In 1926 the TSS *Neptunia* was owned by the Sitmar Line [Societa Italiana Trasporti Marittimi] and it made three luxury cruises to Spitzbergen in the summer of 1926. It was a ship with a chequered history with Sitmar intending her for Mediterranean cruises. Built in 1913 as North German Lloyd's *Sierra Salvada*; seized by Brazil in 1917 and renamed *Avare*; returned to Germany after the War and again renamed *Peer Gynt*. In 1926 she operated for the Sitmar Line as the *Neptunia* before being returned to Germany the following year for another change of name, *Oceana*. In 1945, after World War II she became an "Empire" ship under a British flag, the *Empire Tarne*, before finally ending her days in 1946, as the Russian *Sibir*.

Olga (or Helga), born in about 890 AD, was the wife of Prince Igor of Russia and after his death in 945 AD she was regent for their son. In 957 AD (not 955 AD as on the medal) she visited Constantinople. She either then, or earlier, became a Christian though she did not succeed in converting her son.

Cuba, The Capture of Morro Castle, Havana and the deaths of Don Luis de Velasco and Vincenzo Gonzales, Copper Medal, 1763, by T F Prieto, conjoined busts right, bewigged and wearing frock coats, rev the fort's magazine explodes with great force, ships and boats around, soldiers on the land, IN MORRO VIT GLOR FVNCT, 49mm (Betts 443; Medina 12; Eimer 704). Nearly very fine and rare. £250-300

Morro Castle was captured from the Spanish in August 1762 by a huge British fleet of 200 vessels and 14,000 men, under the joint command of Lord Albermarle and Admiral Sir George Pocock. The British soldiers are seen on the medal, on 30 July, storming the fort as it explodes, sending the bodies of the defenders into the air. ex Edward Roehrs Collection

The Union Franco-Americaine was established to oversee the gift of the Statue of Liberty, which was sculpted by Bartholdi and engineered by Gustave Eiffel. The opening ceremony was held on the 28 October 1886.

In 1907 a US Navy Fleet embarked on a circumnavigation of the globe which was completed in 1909. The fleet comprised 16 battle ships, along with escorts, all of which had their hulls painted white, the US Navy's peacetime colour. It was a display of goodwill which also served to prove the seaworthiness of the navy, enforce treaties and protect overseas holdings.



2834 USA, The United States Antarctic Expedition, 1939-1941, Service Medal, an unnamed bronze specimen, the globe as seen from Antarctica, *rev* legend, 34mm, suspension ring and ribbon. *Extremely fine, rare.*

This medal was awarded by Congress to those who participated in the third expedition led by Admiral Richard E Byrd (1888-1957). It was the first one on which he had the official backing of the US Government. The project included extensive studies of geology, biology, meteorology and exploration. However, in March 1940 Byrd was recalled to active duty in the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations. The expedition continued in Antarctica without him. 60 medals were awarded in gold, including one to Admiral Byrd, 50 in both silver and bronze, the bronze being for those who only made one summer trip. The medal was designed by John R Sinnock, Chief Engraver of the Philadelphia Mint.



Davies Gilbert (born Davies Giddy, 1767-1839), engineer, author, and politician, President of the Royal Society (1827-1830). He served Cornwall as High Sheriff and MP for Helston, then Bodmin. It was Gilbert who obtained William IV's Royal Patronage in 1835, no doubt the reason he received the medal which shows the Society's name with the Royal prefix.

François Espinasse appears in the later Post Office Directories at several address, 1 Hill Street, 38 Frederick Street and 1 London Street. The double fleur-de-lis marks are seen to either side of the initials. Similar marks on silver from earlier in the century are found for Robert Robertson of Cupar.

Exploration, United Kingdom, Royal Geographical Society, Gilt-bronze Medal, for the East Africa Expedition, 1878-1880, Minerva stands by globe and sextant, *rev* legends and wreath, 39mm. *Pierced, scuffed and bruised, fine and very rare.*£300-400

The medal was struck for presentation to the members of the expedition led by Alexander Keith Johnston (1844-1879), to Lakes Nyasa and Tanganyika. Johnston died from malaria and dysentry in Beho Beho, some 120 miles from Dar es Salaam. The expedition was completed under the leadership of Joseph Thompson (1858-1904), who was to receive the Society's gold Founder's Medal in 1885.

Burtin first learn to to fly in 1912, becoming a military pilot in 1916. Twice shot down and seriously wounded, he was awarded the Military Medal and the Croix de Guerre. At the time of this award he was working on developing a system of instrument flying – flying blind. He was also breaking altitude records and in 1930 he participated in the Paris-Tokyo-Paris race.

The medal commemorates the discovery of their remains.

- 4.1. Before the auction, all potential Bidders must notify their name and address to the auctioneer and if required provide proof of identity to our satisfaction and bank or other credit references.
- 4.2. The highest Bidder for each Lot shall be the Buyer. If there is a dispute, the auctioneer shall have absolute discretion to determine the dispute including re-offering the disputed Lot for sale.
- 4.3. A Bidder must submit a bid for an entire Lot and each lot constitutes a separate sale. The auctioneer shall however have an absolute discretion to divide any Lot, to combine any two or more Lots, or to withdraw any Lot from the auction without giving any reason (including after the hammer has fallen). 5. PAYMENT

- 5.3. Any lot marked with a dagger (†) is subject to import VAT at 5%, this will be added to the hammer price and is payable by the buyer if resident in the EU. If the lot is being exported outside the EU, this import VAT can be waived or refunded on proof of export.

- 7.2. For the purposes of these Conditions, a 'Forgery' means an imitation that has been created with the fraudulent intent to deceive in respect of the authorship, origin, date, age, period and the correct

description does not correspond with the description in the Catalogue and as a result has a value significantly less than it would have been had it been genuine.

7.3. You must notify us in writing within one month of you becoming aware that the Lot may be a Forgery. The Lot must be returned to us in the same condition as at the time of sale and you must submit evidence that the Lot is a Forgery, the onus being on you to prove that it is a Forgery.

- 7.6. If we agree that the Lot is a Forgery then subject to:
- (a) you being able to confirm in writing that you can transfer legal and beneficial title to the Lot to us or as directed by us free from all encumbrances or third party claims of any nature; and
 - (b) the exclusions in Condition 7.7,

then the sale of the Lot will be rescinded so that it is cancelled and we will refund the Purchase Price to you in full.

- 7.7. Your right to return the Lot and receive a refund of the Hammer Price under the Guarantee is your sole remedy against us, our agents and subcontractors and/or the Seller for a Forgery. You will not be entitled to claim interest on the amount due to you. Neither we, our agents or sub-contractors nor the Seller shall be liable for costs, expenses, damages or any other liability however it arises relating to a Forgery.
- 7.8. In accordance with the restriction in Condition 10.2, the benefit of the Guarantee is personal to the original Buyer and is not transferable to a new owner of the Lot or any other person.

8. EXCLUSION OF LIABILITY

- 8.1. Except where these Conditions expressly state otherwise, no warranty is given to a Buyer concerning a Lot and each Lot is sold as shown with all faults, imperfections, errors of description (including authorship, origin, age, size, condition or value) or lack of authenticity or genuineness and neither we nor the Seller nor any of our agents or sub-contractors will be liable for any damages, costs, expenses or any other liability arising out of the same whether or not caused by negligence.
- 8.2. Our maximum liability under these Conditions is the amount of the Purchase Price paid by you.
- 8.3. Neither we nor any of our agents or sub-contractors shall be liable, whether in tort (including negligence or breach of statutory duty), contract, misrepresentation or otherwise:
- (a) for loss of profits or business, depletion of goodwill and/or similar losses; loss of contracts; or
- (b) any special, indirect, consequential or pure economic loss, costs, damages, charges or expenses.
- 8.4. We shall not be liable to you or be deemed to be in breach of these Conditions by reason of any delay in performing, or any failure to perform, any of our obligations in the Conditions, if the delay or failure was due to any cause beyond our reasonable control.
- 8.5. Nothing in these Conditions excludes or limits our liability for any matter which it would be illegal for us to exclude or attempt to exclude under English law or for our fraud or fraudulent misrepresentation.

9. DATA PROTECTION

9.1. By agreeing to these Conditions, a Bidder acknowledges and agrees that we will use personal information of a Bidder for the purpose of the auction and ancillary matters, including providing a Buyer's personal details to any other person where necessary to enforce our rights under these Conditions.

10. GENERAL

- 10.1. These Conditions and the Seller's Conditions constitute the entire agreement between us. All other terms, warranties and representations, express or implied by statute or otherwise are excluded to the fullest extent permitted by law. No variation to these Conditions shall be legally binding unless agreed in writing by us.
- 10.2. All rights and benefits granted to a Bidder under these Conditions are personal to him and may not be assigned or in any other way transferred to any other person. Any such assignment or transfer will be invalid and unenforceable against us.
- 10.3. A notice required or permitted to be given by either of us to the other under these Conditions shall, in the case of a Bidder, be to the last address notified to us and in the case of Baldwin's, shall be to its registered office.
- 10.4. No failure or delay by us in exercising any of our rights under these Conditions shall be deemed to be a waiver of that right, and no waiver by us of any breach of these Conditions by you shall be considered as a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or any other provision.
- 10.5. We may perform our obligations and exercise our respective rights through any of our group companies or assign our rights under these Conditions.
- 10.6. If any provision of these Conditions is held by any court or other competent authority to be invalid or unenforceable in whole or in part, the validity of the other provisions and the remainder of the provision in question shall not be affected.
- 10.7. English law shall apply to these Conditions and we both agree to the English courts having exclusive jurisdiction.

11. INTERPRETATION

11.1. In these Conditions:
