

Populated by Phoenicians, Ebusus was a close ally of Carthage. Barclay Head believed that its silver coinage was likely to have been contemporary to that of Emporiae, and ended with the island's submission to Rome in 217 B.C. The mace and hammer that Bes holds on the obverse of this coin may be an allusion to the ancient belief that the Ebususian soil possessed a property which destroyed venomous reptiles: Ebusi terra serpentes fugat (Plin. II.N.iii.v.II).

Kraay estimates the production of about 25 Apollo head obverses from Leontinoi of which this one is probably the rarest (this includes the two dies usually attributed to the Demaretion master). An example of this die is lacking from Gulbenkian, Moretti, Kunstfreund, Hunt, and many other major collections.

This is the only Leontinoi die of the Apollo head type which fully expresses the middle to mature Greek archaic stylistic idiom, c.550-490 B.C., in its adoption of the Greek archaic anatomic conventions of eye structure, a high cheek and prominent lips forming the archaic smile, and defined protuberant chin.

A Very Rare Motya Tetradrachm of Attractive Style

The distinctive and powerful style of the obverse of this coin shows without doubt that the artist was influenced by Kimon whose late style dekadrachms, rendering Arethusa with heavier features and a sense of great presence, are considered to be true masterpieces of Greek coinage.

A Beautiful Drachm of Naxos, with a Distinguished Pedigree Published by Cahn and a Rizzo Plate Coin

Selinos , the most westerly of Sicily's Greek cities, was set near the mouth of the River Selinos and a few miles from the mouth of the Hypsas, not far from where the modern city of Marinela is now. After the expulsion of the tyrants in the mid-5th Century B.C., Selinos rose to considerable power and wealth. But at some point during this glorious period, the city was stricken with a pestilence, most likely some form of malaria stirred by the stagnant waters of the surrounding marshlands. The Selinuntines besought aid from the famed philosopher Empedokles of Akragas, who was held in great esteem for his profound knowledge of nature and the treatment of disease and epidemics.

Empedokles put an end to the plague by shrewdly joining the channels of two neighboring streams. To show their gratitude, the citizens conferred divine honors upon him while recording the episode for all time numismatically. On this coin, Apollo, in his role as a healing god, prepares to slay the city's pestilence with his arrow. Artemis stands with him, literally driving him, as a symbol of the plight of the Selinuntine women during the plague and their deliverance. On the reverse, the river-god Selinos makes a formal libation to the healing god for cleansing the waters.

An Old Collection of Syracuse Tetradrachms The Property of a Gentleman

This collection comprises examples of some of the most beautiful tetradrachms produced at Syracuse during the 5th Century BC.It was put together with a keen eye for both quality and style, and includes the work of the master engravers of the period, such as Kimon, Euianetos, Sosion, Eumenes, Eukleidas and Phrygillos. Many of the coins below are considered to represent the finest die-engraving of the ancient Greek world; the outstanding example is perhaps the facing head of Arethusa by Kimon (lot 55). All have prior provenance, mostly to Swiss auctions.

A Highly Important and Unique 6th Century Thraco-Macedonian Tetradrachm and a Prototype for the Early Issues of Syracuse



Thraco-Macedonian Region, Uncertain Mint (Olynthos?) (c.510 B.C.), Silver Tetradrachm, 16.98g. Charioteer, wearing a long chiton, holding a kentron in his right hand and reins in his left, driving a quadriga right, a thick pellet above, two exergual bars below. Rev. Apart from being extremely rare, it is clear that this very important issue served as a prototype for the early issues of Syracuse (see Boehringer 1 and the next lot for the earliest Syracusan issues). This coin is the very earliest of the issue that has traditionally been attributed to Olynthos, although Cahn argued that there is no firm evidence to support this. The fabric is however clearly Thraco-Macedonian, so it is perhaps more accurate to describe it as such.

This coin has an interesting history, having been offered to E.P. Warren in 1903 before residing in an English collection until the early 1970s. Cahn was able to study a plaster cast of the coin offered to Warren, currently in the Berlin museum, and was able to confirm that it was indeed the same coin as the example offered here.

The instantly recognizable Demareteion series ranks among the most famous and beautiful of all the archaic and classical coinage of Syracuse. This dies are clearly the work of a master engraver, whose exceptional ability can also be witnessed through those which he created for Leontinoi. The Demareteion coins have a very distinctive and powerful style, quite unlike anything else seen on the coinage of Syracuse. The eye is heavy-lidded and the lips sit rather pronounced above noticeably pointed chin. In the hair, an olive-wreath majestically crowns Arethusa, and a lock of hair curls downwards behind her ear.

The name for this important series of coins is taken from queen Demarete, the wife of the Syracusan tyrant Gelon. Following the victory of Gelon and his father-in-law, Theron, tyrant of Akragas, over the Carthaginians at the battle of Himera in 480 B.C., Demarete intervened in negotiations to secure favourable peace terms for the defeated invaders. As a mark of their gratitude, they presented Demarete with one hundred talents of gold, from the proceeds of which were struck the 'Demareteion' series.

Eukleidas was a very distinguished master engraver and, together with the work of the other Sicilian artists of his generation, has given the late 5th Century coinage of Syracuse the reputation of being the most beautiful ever produced. His three-quarter facing head of Athena is without doubt his greatest achievement, and he signed the die as a record of his work. Eukleidas's reverse die was in fact the very first of the Syracusan issues to depict a facing head. It was of course more usual for Arethusa, rather than Athena, to appear on the coinage of Syracuse. It has been suggested in the past that the facing head on this coin could be that of Arethusa, wearing the helmet of Athena in commemoration of the Syracusan victory following the Athenian invasion in 415 B.C. However there is no real justification to dispute that the head is that of Athena, given that she was also honoured at Syracuse and that a temple was devoted to her on the island of Ortygia.

Eukleidas's facing head tetradrachm was an extremely important innovation in die-engraving, illustrating the potential that could be achieved by the late 5th Century at Syracuse. The artist Kimon, influenced by Eukleidas, soon went on to create his great Arethusa facing head tetradrachm (see lot 55), this time bringing the design to the obverse of the coin, and it in turn served as an important influence on other coinages in the ancient Greek world. This influence can be traced back to Eukleidas's original facing head of Athena, a legacy of the finest talent of the Sicilian die engravers, and a true masterpiece of late 5th Century numismatic art.

This sublime coin displays the very finest talent of the master artist Kimon and this pair of dies is without doubt one of his greatest achievements. The head of Arethusa, brought here to the obverse of the coin and set in stunning facing majesty, is both arresting and at the same time serene. Her eyes stare longingly out from the composition, providing the viewer with a genuine sense of the divine and other-worldly. Then, outside of this peaceful gaze, the viewer is overwhelmed by a surprising amount of activity. Her hair flows wildly out behind her and down towards her shoulders and, from this busy arrangement, we can see dolphins emerging into view. These creatures seem almost to be playfully moving to and fro between the locks of her hair. The reverse of the coin is full of animation and energy, with the quadriga viewed in three-quarter perspective. The horses are rearing and tossing their heads in the heat of the moment as they speed towards their point of victory. This issue is without doubt one of the most important of the late 5th Century B.C.



An Apparently Unrecorded Thraco-Macedonian Electrum Stater, of Great Beauty and Fascination, and of Great Importance

This coin appears to be lacking a direct comparison in the published numismatic literature. The closest parallel is an electrum stater in the British Museum collection, of similar type, but of a wholly different style and execution. The above coin has been compared with that stater, identified as Orreskioi (?). The obverse of the British Museum's coin is inferior in terms of both style and execution, displaying a distinct lack of detail when compared with the above coin. The fabric and production of the Museum's example is also very different, suggesting it is somewhat earlier; the reverse of the above coin displays a much shallower incuse square, which has been neatly divided into four parts corresponding to other Thraco-Macedonian issues of the early 5th Century B.C.

Alongside other electrum issues from the Thraco-Macedonian region, the example above compares favourably. It displays all the defining characteristics, having flan cracks which follow a jagged pattern and possess a roughly textured inner surface. The coin above, under magnification, has a number of small fissures to its surface and on its edge, which can also be seen on other electrum coins of this period, as can the way in which the obverse field rises slightly as it approaches the edge.

The mythical centaurs inhabited the woods and mountains of Elis, Arcadia and Thessaly, and reports of them date as far back as Homeric writings. They were characterized by their wild and lustful desires, as can be seen on the obverse of the above coin. This very important electrum issue depicts a superb rendering of the centaur, full of animation and energy.

Although the precise location of mintage of this fascinating coin is uncertain, it seems that it almost certainly originates from Northwest Asia Minor. It has been struck on the Phokaian standard, which was prevalent in that region in the early 6th Century, encompassing the districts of Teos, Sardes and Kyzikos. As the chimaera appears on the obverse, early suggestions were made by scholars that it might have originated from Corinth or Sikyon. However, this is extremely unlikely since the style, fabric, and reverse all point to an Asia Minor attribution.

The mythical chimaera, a fire-breathing, monstrous creature with the combined parts of a lion, goat and serpent, originated in Lycia, and from there spread across to mainland Greece where it can be seen to manifest itself particularly on the coinage of Sikyon in the Peloponnese. It is unlikely that this points to the coin having a Lycian origin, because the Phokaian standard, on which this is struck, would not have been used there. The city of Zeleia, which belonged to the territory of Kyzikos, has been suggested as a possible attribution, as it is reported to have had a Lycian population which could help to explain the choice of obverse type. Although the Zeleia attribution is a strong possibility, there is of course no firm evidence to confirm it, so it is perhaps better to suggest a northwest Asia Minor origin.

This impressive issue was struck to commemorate the marriage of Alexander Balas to Cleopatra Thea in c.150 B.C. Her union with Alexander I produced a child, Antiochos VI. Alexander was killed in 145 B.C., after which Cleopatra married Demetrios II and bore him their sons Seleukos V and Antiochos VIII. Demetrios was later captured by the Parthians, whereupon Cleopatra married Antiochos VII; their son was Antiochos IX. Demetrios was released by the Parthians only to be murdered on the orders of Cleopatra Thea in 125 B.C. She then arranged for the death of her son Seleukos V, who had succeeded Demetrios, before attempting to place herself as ruler of Syria, along with her son Antiochos VIII. After attempting to also remove him, she was forced to take her own life in 121 B.C.

The above example was one of the first two of this issue to be discovered in the late 19th Century.



A GROUP OF 'JUDAEA CAPTA' SESTERTII

The Jewish War began in A.D. 66 and Vespasian, assisted by his son Titus, had been given command of the legions resisting the revolt. Following the death of Nero in A.D. 68, the emperors Galba and Otho followed in quick succession. During this period of unrest, Vespasian was also hailed emperor by the legions under his command and he therefore turned his attention to Rome to compete with Vitellius for the imperial throne, entrusting his son Titus with the control of the Jewish War. After an assault on Jerusalem, Titus took the city in A.D. 70, during which time the Temple of Jerusalem was destroyed. It was reported by the historian Josephus that in the region of 1,100,000 people were killed during this battle. A number of contemporary issues commemorated the Roman victory in Judaea.

The brief reign of Andronicus I has been summarized as "violent and lascivious" by some historians. Blessed both in mind and body, Andronicus was eloquent, a great general and able politician, but also licentious and harsh. Twice married, his numerous mistresses included Eudoxia, niece of emperor Manuel and Theodora Komnena, widow of Baldwin III, Latin king of Jerusalem. In his efforts to reform the empire and stop corruption he was ruthless, gaining enemies as he went. Growing increasingly paranoid, Andronicus ordered the execution of all prisoners, exiles and their families in 1185. Riots ensued, while the general chaos inspired William II, the Norman king of Sicily, to invade and pillage Thessalonica. Andronicus was deposed; he fled, but was captured and given over to the mob who tortured him for three days before he was brought to the Hippodrome and cruelly executed.

The style of this Dinar is identical to the last coinage type of Abu-Sa'id, with the square Kufic *kalima* on the "religious" side of the coin. This type was subsequently employed by Arpa Khan, Musa Khan, Muhammad Khan and Taghay Timur. The design may have enabled a common exchangeability between the coinages of these short-lived rulers. Although the gold coins were not struck to any fixed weight standard, and therefore varied considerably in value from coin to coin, the silver was issued to a fixed standard of 2.88g for the Double Dirham.

Set in the southern reaches of South America, Tierra del Fuego, the "Land of Fire," is so named for the many fires of the native Yaghan peoples that Ferdinand Magellan saw when he became the first European to visit the archipelago in 1520. Francis Drake followed later in the 16th century, a Dutch East Indies Company expedition in 1616, and much later, the famed HMS *Beagle* in 1830. By the mid-19th century, the "Land of Fire" came under Argentine and Chilean influence. When large amounts of placer gold was discovered there in 1879, a curious and colorful mishmash of adventurers, miners and soldiers of fortune poured in. Perhaps the most colorful was a young Romanian Jewish mining engineer, prospector and adventurer, Julius Popper. Born in Bucharest in 1857, Julius was the son of Neftali Popper, a prominent Hebrew teacher and prosperous dealer in books and antiques. He left Romania at an early age to seek knowledge and adventure. Popper studied in Paris, and travelled about the Orient, the US, Mexico and Cuba involving himself in engineering projects and the development of mining techniques. In Cuba, he designed Havana's first sewer system and framed the modern outline for the city.

In 1885, a very well-rounded Popper arrived in Argentina, an excellent civil, mechanical and mining engineer, a polyglot who spoke and wrote a dozen languages fluently, a navigator, cartographer, military commander and administrator. On September 7, 1886, he launched the "Popper Expedition" with 18 members and found gold dust on El Páramo beach in the Patagonian peninsula. Soon his *Compania del Lavaderos de Oro del Sud* had found a great deal of gold, and tallied up great gains on the Argentine Stock Exchange. Meanwhile, Popper carved his own little kingdom out of Tierra del Fuego. Guarded by a small army outfitted in quasi-Austro-Hungarian uniforms, it saw frequent attacks from Chile and Argentina.

Resourceful in his administration, Popper designed new gold extraction machines, printed stamps for his postal service and issued private coinage. Struck by the Buenos Aires mint, Popper issued two gold coins in 1889, a one and five gram, the latter inscribed "Lavaderos de Oro del Sud" – both greatly prized by collectors today.

The Popper fiefdom, though, did not last long. Julius Popper died under mysterious circumstances in 1893 in Buenos Aires, and it was suspected that either rivals or unpaid creditors were behind his death. At Popper's funeral, the prominent writer Lucio Vicente Lopez called him a national hero, another Livingstone. In recent times, he has been the subject of the 2000 Chilean film "Tierra del Fuego."

PAONANOPAO O OhpKI KOPANO, nimbate, diademed and crowned half-length Huvishka bust facing on the clouds, head left, holding mace-sceptre and the hilt of his sword with his other hand. Rev. MIopo, Miopo (Mithra) standing left, hand extended in benediction, tamgha in left field (MK 292/3 (O1/R1); not listed by Donum Burns). About extremely fine. Extremely rare, Göbl cites only four examples.



Kushan. Huvishka. Gold Dinar. AV, 7.98g. Third Emission. Obv. Nimbate, diademed and crowned half-length bust of Huvishka facing, head left, on clouds, holding a mace-sceptre in one hand and a filleted spear, in the other, over his shoulder. Rev. MIOpO, Miopo (Mithra) standing left holding a wreath in his extended hand, his other hand on a sword hilt, tamgha before (see Göbl 275; Donum Burns 259). Extremely fine, small, shallow spade mark on king's shoulder.



Kushan. "Samudra" (c.350-375 AD). Gold Dinar. AV, 7.63g. Obv Ruler standing left, sacrificing over altar and holding a filleted trident, second trident in left field, name beneath arm. Rev. The goddess Ardoxsho enthroned facing, tamgha at upper left (MK 611; Donum Burns 813 ("Maiores domus")). Very fine. Rare.

Other than from his coins, this issuer is unknown. Citing stylistic differences with traditional Kushan numismatic iconography, the use of the name "Samudra," and the usage of irregular mints, Göbl argues that this issuer was a field commander, who struck coins on behalf of Samudragupta, in a region as yet incorporated in the Gupta realm; a region where Kushan gold was a staple currency.

This variety of the Chhatra type showing the Goddess standing on a pedestal, the 'moodha' in sanskrit, is extremely rare. The cataloguer has seen only three specimens to date.

This variety of the Chhatra type is less scarce than the others but is remarkable for the depiction of the Goddess on the reverse.

This famous dumpy variety of Chhatra is much rarer than the coins usually found.

Iltutmish was one of the most powerful of the early Sultans of Dehli. He did much to consolidate the sultanate in northern India, his realms spreading also to Bengal, where local governors issued coins in his name. He was one of the so-called "slave kings", brought up and trained while slaves but able to achieve high honour. This coin type has the legend in the obverse margin: "min kharaj qanauj wa kafar". There are a number of varieties depending on the number of dots found in the segments between the double squares and circle on both sides.

It should be noted that, on coins of the Sultans of Dehli, a small circle always represents "0" and never "5", as it does on Mughal coins from the latter part of Akbar's reign. This means that the date is sure to be an error for 840 rather than being 854 (which would make the coin a posthumous issue during the reing of 'Alam Shah). It should also be noted that the Sultans of Dehli Silver Tankas of this particular period weigh as much as the Rupees that were introduced a hundred years later by the Suris.

The year 1788 (AH 1202) was a year of turmoil for the Mughal Empire. Shah Alam II was deposed and blinded by the Rohilla chieftain Ghulam Qadir on 27 Shawwal 1202 and Bedar Bakht was placed on the throne. This was the 29th year of Shah Alam II. It cannot be said with certainty whether the coin offered here was struck during the first part of the year when Shah Alam II was ruling or it was minted on the authority of Bedar Bakht in the latter half of 1202, but struck in the name of Shah Alam II. Either attribution is possible.

These Rupees are stylistically slightly different from other Rupees of the period and have a different five-petalled flower symbol to the right of the regnal year. It is known that the French struck Murshidabad Rupees at Chandernagor during this year so it is possible that these are French rather than British issues. However, both Rupees have the crescent mark in the middle line of the obverse that the British issues also have.

The Hijra year 1203 was a period of turmoil and change for the Indian Emperors. It saw the rule of Delhi changing from the hands of Shah Alam II to Bedar Bakht, from Bedar Bakht to Muhammad Akbar II and from Muhammad Akbar II to Shah Alam II again. The young Prince Akbar II was enthroned by the Rohilla chief Ghulam Qadir. Mirza Akbar Shah wrote to Nawab Faizullah Khan: "...on 14th Muharram (15th October) the imperial throne was illuminated by our august accession and the sound of the kettle-drum of felicitations reached the ears of the inhabitants of earth and the world above ... the face of Gold and Silver coins shone brighter than the sun and the moon by the effluence of the impression, of our name on them". This reign was very short lived when Ghulam Qadir ran away and Mahadaji Scindhia captured Delhi to reinstate the blind emperor Shah Alam II to the throne on 17 October 1788. It is very interesting to note that the emperor has left us a written record of the fact that Khutba was read and coins were struck in both gold and silver for such a short reign and that both such coins have been discovered. This coin was struck by the Maharaja for ritual purposes. The Maharaja was the caretaker of the famous Padmanabhaswamy Temple in Travancore that, in July 2011, yielded one the largest treasure troves of gold coins and jewellery known. Press have reported the treasures value to be nearly \$20 billion. The panel of experts, appointed by the Supreme Court of India, found gold coins weighing a total of 530kg amongst which were in the region of 17kg of gold coins from the East India Company period and 14kg of coins minted in Travancore.

At the accession of Shah Alam II, the city and fortress of Allahabad was in the possession of the Nawab Vizier of Awadh. From 1765 to 1771 the Mughal Emperor was in residence in Allahabad. The Allahabad coins normally belong to the East India Company from AH 1198 onwards.

The introduction of fish mint-mark on the coin is interesting because such a mark appears only on the East India coins of Year 25 and 26. This mark has not been found on any other coins of Allahabad. For historical accounts see KM 12th edition, p.1193.

In early 1672, King Louis XIV of France declared war on the United Provinces, a conflict which lasted for seven years. Arms and ammunition had to be purchased, so the estates of Holland appealed to the rich citizens to hand in their silver so that it could be minted into coins. As there was great urgency, a mint was opened in a disused tower in Amsterdam. 25 workers were hired and the mintmaster from Enkhuysen was asked to supervise the minting. According to Brause-Mansfield, the whole operation was so well organised that within ten months time five million speciethalers were minted. They are considered emergency coins as they were minted from silver supplied by the population. The Klippe Thalers, of which this unique specimen is the heaviest known, were part of the coin issue of 1673 and were probably presentation pieces.

The portrait is taken from a much reproduced life drawing by Pierre Eugene du Simitiere (1737-1784), the Geneva-born artist and Freemason, who also designed the Seal of the State of New Jersey.

von Steuben was a Prussian aristocrat and military officer who served as Inspector General and Major General of the Continental Army during the American Revolutionary War. Born in Magdeburg, he was educated by the Jesuits in Breslau before joining the Prussian army in 1746. By 1761 he was aide-de-camp to Frederick the Great and the following year became one of the 13 members of the "Special Class for the Art of War". In 1764 he was appointed Chamberlain to the Duke of Hohenzollern-Hechingen and used the title Baron from 1769, the same year that he was conferred with the Order of Fidelity, an honorary knighthood, by Charles Frederick, Margrave of Baden-Durlach, later 1st Grand Duke of Baden. In 1777 he met Benjamin Franklin in Paris and was encouraged to travel to America with a letter of introduction by Franklin to George Washington. Between 1778-1783, as Inspector General he helped build-up the Continental Army, introduced bayonet training, military drills and tactics He helped with the victories at the Battles of Barren Hill (20 May 1778), Monmouth (28 June 1778) and Stony Point (16 July 1779). He wrote the "Revolutionary War Drill Manual". He aided Nathaniel Greene in the South, and (29 September 1780) sat with him at the court-martial of the British army officer Major John André. At Yorktown (28 September - 19 October 1781) he commanded one of Washington's divisions and served as his Chief of Staff. He received his discharge in 1783 and was rewarded with the somewhat modest Steuben House in Bergen County, New Jersey, originally built in 1752 by Jan Zabriskie, where he lived his final years with his homosexual companion, Captain Benjamin Walker. His memory is kept very much alive with von Steuben Day and Parade (the third Saturday of September - his birthday was the 17th); The Steuben Society of America, founded in 1919 and a statue by Albert Jaegers in Lafayette Park, Washington, DC.

CONDITIONS OF SALE
